NOTICE OF ENFORCEMENT OF VILLAGE OF GREENWICH ORDINANCE

Section 12

No automobile or other vehicles shall be left parked or standing on the public highways of the Village for an unreasonable length of time and so as to become a nuisance and obstruct the cleaning or removal of snow from the streets and highways of the Village and any vehicle left so parked or standing on the streets of the Village shall be removed at the expense of the owner.

Violation of this Ordinance shall constitute disorderly conduct and every person violating the same shall be a disorderly person and shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed \$25.00.

All tickets not answered will be turned into the Department of Motor Vehicles, and owner of said vehicle will be unable to register vehicle when due date comes for registration of said vehicle.

The Town of Greenwich held its 2000 organization meeting Tuesday evening at the town office building. Prior to the meeting, recently elected and re-elected town officials were administered their oaths of office in a ceremony conducted by Town Attorney Alan Wrigley, as family, friends and well-wishers looked on.

Upon opening the meeting, Town Supervisor Don Wilbur welcomed the board's newest councilman, Bob Jeffords. Jeffords defeated former Councilman Brent Patten in the Republican caucus, and ran unopposed in the general election. Until December 31, Jeffords served on the Village Board of Trustees. He will not be replaced in that position, since the village elections will be held in March.

The board chose to combine its regular January meeting with its organization meeting, so the regular meeting that would have been held next Tuesday evening was canceled. The special meeting scheduled for January 18 to conduct the annual audit and to interview candidates for planning board vacancies will be held as scheduled, however.

During the organization meeting, Glens Falls National Bank & Trust Co.,

Evergreen Bank and Trustco Bank were named as official depositories for the several funds of the town. *The Journal-Press* and the *Eagle* were named the town's official newspapers. The board reaffirmed the town's purchasing policies and set the salary and wage schedules for elected and appointed officials and town employees.

The board made the following appointments for the year 2000: Charles Spear - Dog Control Officer and Animal Control Officer, Daniel O'Connor - Code Enforcement Officer, Dr. William Sarchino - Health Officer, and Melody Becroft - Special Issues Clerk.

Supervisor's appointments

Councilman Bob Barber was named Deputy Supervisor. Marge Wilbur was named Clerk to the Supervisor and Budget Officer. Roxy Penrick and Joyce Kelly were named court clerks. Elaine Kelly was named Registrar of Vital Statistics, and Cathy Sharp was named Historian.

Returned check fee

The board set a \$15.00 fee on returned checks issued to the town. This is a new policy, and signs to that effect will be conspicuously posted in the clerk's office.

LESTER J. STEPHENS

Lester J. Stephens, 96, a resident of Cottage Street, died Friday, December 31, 1999, at the Glens Falls Hospital in Glens Falls. Funeral services were held on Wednesday, January 5, at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Greenwich, with the Rev. Charles Miller officiating. Burial will be in the spring at Greenwich Cemetery. Friends may call at any time at the family home.

He was born May 16, 1903, the son of John and Florence (Gray) Stephens, in Milton.

Mr. Stephens attended Troy Conference Academy in Poulney, and Middlebury College in Middlebury, both in Vermont.

He was vice-president of the Stevens and Thompson Paper Company in Greenwich for many years, and served as Director of the Civil Defense for Washington County.

He was a former member of the Greenwich Board of Education and a member and past-president of the

GEORGE REID MULLIGAN

George Reid Mulligan, 81, passed away at the family home on Eddy Street on Friday, December 31, 1999, after a long illness.

He was born August 19, 1918, the son of Hugh and Margaret Reid Mulligan. He was employed by the Stevens and Thompson Paper Mill in Greenwich for more than 40 years, retiring in 1980.

Mr. Mulligan joined the United States Army on December 12, 1942. Following basic training he was sent to England. In April of 1944 he was assigned to Exercise Tiger and while aboard the LST507, participating in an undisclosed mock invasion at Devon, his boat was torpedoed and sunk by German E-Boats. George was one of only a few survivors after being in the English Channel for more than an hour. This undisclosed exercise remained a secret, known only to participants, until June 1974 when many such events of WW II were lifted through the Freedom of Information Act. He took part in the Normandy Invasion of June 6, 1944, later serving in France and Germany until the end of the war. He was Honorably Discharged on December 22, 1945.

He was a communicant of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Greenwich, was a member of the Vestry and served as Senior Warden for many years.

He was predeceased by a sister, Edna Tang.

Survivors include his wife of 71 years, Margaret (Curtis) Stephens of Greenwich; two sons, Sanford Gray Stephens of Pensacola Beach, Florida and Peter Dean Stephens of South Portland, Maine; six grandsons and eleven great-grandchildren.

Arrangements were under the direction of Flynn Bros., Inc. Funeral Home in Greenwich.

George enjoyed hunting and fishing, and gardening, sharing his vegetables and flowers with all who stopped by to visit.

He was a charter member and a life member of VFW Post #7291 and was a communicant of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, both in Greenwich.

He was predeceased by two sisters, Margaret and Violet Mulligan, both who died at a very young age.

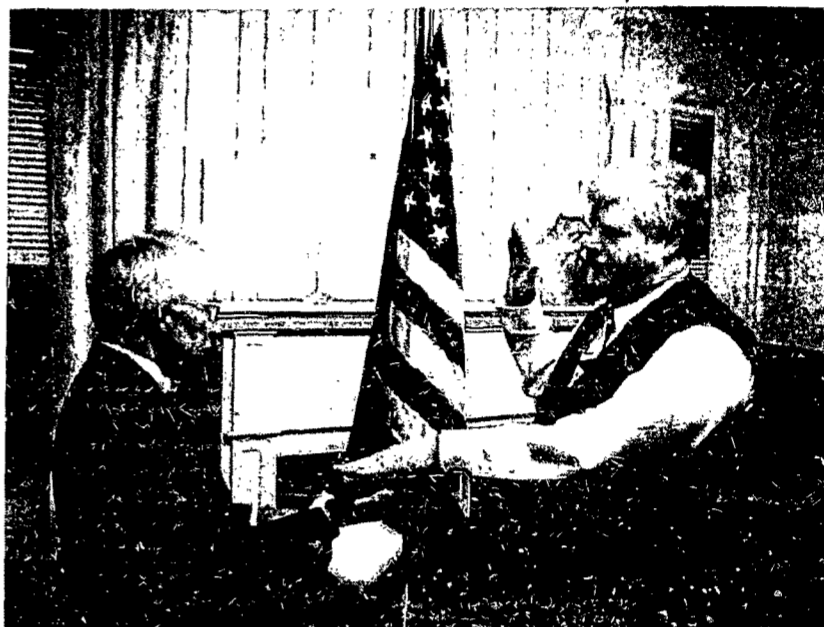
