READY FOR TRIP

Varsity Leaves Wednesday for Down State Trip—Union, Syracuse and Rensselaer to be Played.

Varsity starts on its second basketball trip this season on Wednesday morning on the 6:48 train south. Three games will be played on the trip—the first with Union College at Schenectady, Thursday night. Friday night, Varsity will line up against the Orange five in Syracuse. The last game of the trip will be with Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, at Troy, Saturday night.

Each of these games will be hotly contested by the home teams. Union, although undoubtedly a strong quintet, is an uncertain quantity, as Varsity has not played it recently. Last year Varsity defeated both Rensselaer and Syracuse, and has an equal chance of doing so again.

However, none of the games will be easy. Varsity needs all the support the students can give, and a good showing of St. Lawrence spirit on the part of the students will be of material help. Every effort ought to be made to win a triple victory. With seven out of the nine foreign games, and the results that may be expected in the remaining home games, Varsity's record this year will be unsurpassed.

READY FOR UNION DEBATE OHIO WESLEYAN DEFEATED

Varsity Trio Ready for Hard Contest, Thursday Night—Second Team a Great Help in Preparing Rebuttals—No Further Developments in Cornell Debate.

Probably the hardest debate that St. Lawrence has ever engaged in will be contested in the Town Hall when the Varsity team meets the strong trio from Union on Thursday night. By a striking coincidence, St. Lawrence meets Union in basketball the same night in Schenectady.

The members of both the first and second teams have been hard at work on the subject during the Christmas Recess, and as a result the Varsity expects to put up a hard fight against the down-staters. In order to have the rebuttals well in hand, several impromptu debates have been arranged between the first and second teams, in which the second team will uphold the negative side. The use of a second team in debating is an innovation at St. Lawrence, and has already been found a great improvement over the old method.

The personnel of the judges has not yet been determined, although City Judge Joseph McConnell of Watertown, has been secured, and efforts are being made to secure Justice of the Supreme Court, Edgar Emerson, and Mr. Lytle of the State Department of Education.

No further developments have been reached in the matter of perfecting arrangements for the proposed St. Lawrence-Cornell debate. The Cornell Congress team wishes to debate the St. Lawrence Varsity team. St. Lawrence is willing to debate the Cornell Congress as a St. Lawrence Debating Society team, but not as a University team. Notice to this effect has been sent the secretary of the Cornell society, but thus far no answer has been received.

The Union team will arrive here Thursday afternoon, and will be quartered in one of the hotels.

H. T. Kearns, '13, occupied the pulpit of the Universalist church at Winthrop, yesterday.

Alpha Omicron of Alpha Tau Omega gave a smoker on Thursday evening to the basketball team. The Ohio Wesleyan team was unable to attend, as they had a hard game scheduled for Friday evening, but their coach, Mr. St. John, spoke in their behalf. Two senior representatives from each of the men's fraternities were present. Light refreshments were served and all enjoyed themselves to the utmost.

Varsity Trims Up Westerners to the Tune of 33 to 19—First Half Ends a Tie—Varsity Completely Outplays Opponents in Second Period.

The Varsity team played its first home game after the New York trip on Thursday night. The final score was thirty-three to nineteen, in favor of St. Lawrence. The team of Ohio Wesleyan University showed plenty of pluck and gave the St. Lawrence men a hard fight for the honors of the evening. In fact during the first half no appreciable difference could be noted between the playing ability of the two teams, but every one of the spectators realized that St. Lawrence was not bringing out its full possibilities. It was not until the second period was well under way that the Varsity began to play the game which has already won them the reputation of being one of the very fastest teams in the country. Canfield, who was so invaluable upon the recent trip, was not in the game because of disability, and the breaking up of the skillful quintet which has made such a record was a serious drawback. Besides, every man was thinking too much about keeping up the reputation of the team before the student body, and this handicapped the players in their teamwork.

The sudden rise of the St. Lawrence score in the second half showed clearly to any observant person the real calibre of the combination. There was something mysterious in the way the ball suddenly seemed to be attracted toward the basket, whereas previously it had appeared to have an unconquerable aversion to any association with it except when Lafferty started to throw a foul. The strict rulings of the referee, undoubtedly, did not assist the Varsity in getting started, for it seemed as if the slightest push or bit of vigorous play came in for a penalty.

There is little that is of interest in the first half of the contest that can be recorded, as both sides made half their points from shooting fouls. By a singular coincidence Wesleyan scored three field goals and six fouls, and St. Lawrence scored in exactly the same way in making her twelve points. The Varsity simply could not get its team work under way, and if anything was outclassed in this department. Logan was the first to score from the field for St. Lawrence and, not long after he had dropped the ball in the basket, Lafferty and Calder followed suit.

St. Lawrence had its team work in shape by the second period and be-

gan to pass more rapidly and accurately. Logan and Calder soon broke into the lime light by scoring field goals, and after that the game was evenly contested, with the Varsity creeping further into the lead through Lafferty's ability to shoot fouls. Severance had given Fay a hard fight for honors during the first half, but he could not keep his eye on the basket as well in the second. Calder and Logan again started a scoring spasm, and before it was over St. Lawrence's total had mounted up into the thirties and the Ohio boys were wondering how it all happened. Calder obtained four field goals during this second half before he left the game to give Welch a few shots at the basket.
