## LAST SMOKER SUCCESS

**Enthusiasm at High Pitch—Action Taken Regarding Work-out System for Managers—Large Attendance.**

One of the best college smokers ever held on the Hill met at the Beta Theta Pi House Thursday night. The attendance and spirit were both of the best, and the entertainment provided was excellent. The object of the smoker was to arouse spirit for the Hamilton track meet Saturday. Speeches were made by representatives of various college activities, and college songs and cheers kept the spirit at a high pitch.

The smoker was opened by the singing Varsity. Fay Lafferty, '12, presided, and after a few preliminary remarks called on Captain Logan, '12, of the baseball team. Mr. Logan spoke of the baseball season to date, and expressed confidence in Varsity's ability to win the two remaining games. He further spoke on the system of appointing managers for the various athletic teams, and moved that a committee be appointed to consider a competitive working-out system, whereby the best men for managerial positions could be selected. This motion was passed, and Mr. Lafferty appointed as such committee Messrs. Logan, '12, Welch, '12, Martel, '13, Erickson, '13, Carr, '14, and Benjamin, '15.

Manager McIntosh, '13, of the football team, spoke of the schedule for next year. The season opens September 27; with St. Michaels, on the local field. There will then be a game every week, except one, until the final game with Hamilton at Clinton, November 9. Besides St. Michaels, the home games include Norwich, October 19, and Hobart, November 2; and this ought to give the students a chance to see some good football, for all these teams are strong, especially Hobart, which was the best team in the Intercollegiate Union last year. The foreign games will be played with Rochester, October 5; Middlebury, October 26, and Hamilton, November 9. All these games will be stiff propositions, and we shall need a strong and fast team.

Captain Dodds, '12, of the track team, spoke of the hard work done by the men on track and field, and emphasized the good work of the Freshmen who are on the team. F. F. Williams, '12, spoke of the chances of defeating Hamilton in Saturday's meet. W. W. Trench, '13, as cheer leader, impressed the men with the

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## ST. LAWRENCE DEFEATS HAMILTON AT TRACK MEET

**For Third Time This Year a Varsity Team Humbles Hamilton—Dual Meet Won After Hard Fight—Outcome Doubtful Until the Very End—Freeman Breaks Pole Vault Record, Calder the Two Mile Record.**

Three times this year, and in as many sports, has the buff and blue of Hamilton drooped before the scarlet and brown of St. Lawrence. In football last fall the blue battalion fell back before the scarlet line, beaten ten to nothing; in baseball this spring St. Lawrence was again victorious, by a score of four to two; and on Saturday the track men, not to be outdone by the other teams, proved their supremacy in a dual meet by defeating the down-state team by a margin of ten points. The final score was sixty-three to fifty-three.

Hamilton came with every expectation of winning, while the St. Lawrence supporters were none too confident. But the best Hamilton could do was five firsts against the Varsity's eight. The meet was as the contest with Rochester the week before; but it was somewhat different in that, from the very first, St. Lawrence was always in the lead. This lead, to be sure, was never very large, at times falling to a single point.

Again the outcome was settled in the very last events. St. Lawrence had secured a considerable lead after the high jump, but it dwindled to one point when Hamilton swept the boards clean by taking all three places in the half mile event. The hammer throw and the two hundred and twenty yard dash settled things, however. When these had been fought out the Varsity led by eleven points, so that Hamilton's victory in the broad jump made no material difference.

The middle distances furnished the chief excitement of the meet. In the quarter the men were bunched all the way, but Dodds struggled through with a final spurt and captured first. Hitchcock finished second, but later was disqualified. The half mile dashed St. Lawrence's hopes for a while, as the three Hamilton runners took all the points after a heart-breaking finish.

It was another day of conquest for Williams. "Doc" showed a clean pair of heels to Wenigman, the Hamilton flyer, in their three encounters. Sweet and Carnal stuck close in the hammer throw and high jump, tying in each of these events. Freeman had hard luck in the pole vault, for after finishing second he broke the college record by vaulting ten feet, six inches.

Wenigman and Eggleston were the star performers for Hamilton. The latter proved too fast for the local men in the two mile and mile events. Calder finished second in the two mile, coming in under the college record, and in both long distances made a plucky fight.

The meet was a fitting close for a successful year in all branches of athletics.

## TRIP DISAPPOINTING

**Baseball Team Prevented from Playing Hobart by Rain—Keuka Hits the Ball for 12 Runs and Wins.**

The Varsity was unable to play Hobart on account of rain. It was a great disappointment to the players, as everything pointed to another victory. A thunder shower came up just before the start, making it impossible to play on the clay field. Sweet had been warming up in fine style, and Hobart would have been lucky to get a single hit.

Only seven innings could be played at Keuka, as the Varsity men had to catch an early train, but it was long enough for a severe drubbing. St. Lawrence was not up to her usual standard, and Keuka won the game by a score of twelve to two. Logan was hit rather freely in the first three innings and this, coupled with indifferent support, allowed the opponents to pile up their large total. The Varsity was just beginning to hit the Keuka twirler near the close.

St. Lawrence was not so much out-classed as the score would indicate. The men simply couldn't get into the game with any life, the disastrous opening somewhat discouraging them. Also, after the hard trip and without practice since the St. Michael's game the week before, they were in poor shape to put up any fast baseball. St. Lawrence did not register a tally until the fifth. The team opened up their batting eyes in this inning, bunting four of their six hits for two runs.

Keuka started in the very first with two runs. The second inning, however, decided the game, as they pushed six runners across the plate, and then came back in the third for four more. After this, Logan tightened and Keuka failed to score in the three innings following.
