

# Summer brings camps, lessons for children

## Drama workshop

**CHAPPAQUA** — A drama class and workshop for sixth, seventh and eighth graders has been announced by the New Castle Recreation Commission and Chappaqua Drama Group. The class will be held Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at a place to be announced. Classes will run from June 26 through August 4. Peter Clarke, a graduate of Williams College and a drama teacher at the Harvey School, will conduct the workshop. Theatrical improvisation and participation in a scheduled production will be included in the program. Fee is \$20. For registration and information, one may contact the Recreation office.

## Lewisboro camp

**LEWISBORO** — Town Recreation Director Frank Solomita has announced that registration for the town-sponsored seven week camp program will take place Monday, from 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. at Increase Miller, Lewisboro and Meadow Pond Elementary Schools. Each day camp will meet four times weekly at its local

camp site—the elementary school from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. In addition, a fifth day of planned activities including trips will be offered. All youngsters between ages six and 14 can join as well as those boys and girls who will enter the first grade in September.

A special six week program has been set up for children who will enter kindergarten in September. This will be held at the same camp-school sites but will meet only on Wednesday and Thursday mornings from 9:30 to noon. Basic swimming instruction will be offered to all enrolled kindergarten-age children each Friday from 10 a.m. to noon. Registration for the kindergarten camps will take place at the same time as other day camp registration.

Each child enrolled in the day camps will be charged \$5 to cover the cost of arts and crafts projects. In addition, a \$5 swim fee to a maximum of \$15 per family will be charged children whose families have not joined the town pool. Parents who are pool members are asked to bring their pool receipt when registering.

All camp programs will begin Wednesday, July 5. Those un-

able to register June 26 may do so on the first day of camp. For children who live in the Golden-Bridge area, registration will be at Increase Miller Elementary School.

For children in South Salem, Cross River, and Waccabuc, registration will be at the Lewisboro elementary school.

For children in the Vista area, registration will be at the Meadow Pond elementary school.

Children should register at the elementary school campus site at which they normally attend school.

## Art, craft courses

**GREENWICH** — The Art Barn, an experimental center for arts and crafts on Lower Cross Road, has scheduled two four-week sessions this summer. The first runs from June 26 to July 22, and the second from July 24 to August 19.

Classes include portraiture, still life, sculpture, weaving, oil painting, welding, plastics workshop, photography, modern dance, guitar, stained glass, ceramics and weaving. Many of these classes are arranged for both children and adults.

## Nature program

**OSSINING** — A children's week of nature oriented experiences is open to those, 10, 11 and 12, at Teatown Lake Reservation between 9 a.m. and noon. Children may choose the week of July 17 or the week of July 31.

Enrollment is limited and the program will continue rain or shine. The five day course includes plants, animals, and their relationships. This is a first in the series of summer offerings with nature. Interested parents may phone the reservation. Teatown is located three miles northeast of Ossining on Spring Valley Road.

## Kisco camp

**MT KISCO** — Registration is taking place for Camp Iroquois at Leonard Park which is scheduled for June 26 through August 18. Among the

special programs to be offered through the summer are square and folk dancing, children's theatre, trained animal act, puppet show, travelling zoo, ventriloquist, calypso band.

## Carmel swim

**MAHOPAC** — There are still some openings in the 1972 Summer Learn to Swim Program given at Sycamore Park and Mahopac Waterfront starting Saturday, according to the Town of Carmel Recreation & Parks Commission.

The swim lesson program is for an hour each day, Monday through Friday and continues through August. It is taught by certified Red Cross instructors.

This program is offered as a service to the community by the local Recreation & Parks Commission. Registration is open to Town of Carmel residents, age four and over and will cost 75 cents plus ID cards.

## Bedford tennis, pool

**BEDFORD VILLAGE** — It wasn't a very good weekend for swimming, but the Bedford

Village pool opened on schedule last Saturday and will be open on a regular basis from now on.

Those who wish to take advantage of the pool and tennis facilities must have a current park permit. This may still be obtained by applying, in person, to the Town of Bedford Recreation Department weekdays between 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Identification cards are a must for anyone wanting to use the pool or tennis courts.

Since there are only four tennis courts and the demand for them is increasing, special regulations have been set up. They are listed on a bulletin board outside the courts. Adults are to have preference after 6 p.m. during the week and during the day on weekends and a time limit of one hour of playing is set for periods of heavy demand.

Life Saving, swimming and tennis instructions and the tiny tot program will begin at Memorial Field on June 26. Day camp sessions will begin on July 5.

### Armonk

**ARMONK** — The summer program for pre-school children at North Castle Library is the Ecology Summer Reading Game. Children participating in the game may start to report on books they are reading the week of June 26. Children's Librarian Mrs. Sylvia Saltzman will welcome registrants by telephone or at the library.

A film program for pre-school children that will run eight consecutive weeks will begin July 6 at 10:30 a.m. in Armonk and July 7 at 1:30 p.m. in North White Plains. These programs are free and open to all children.

A pre-school story hour is scheduled for children three and one half to five Tuesdays at 1:30 p.m. in Armonk. Children should be registered as soon as possible.

### Kisco

**MT. KISCO** — Registration for the summer reading game is taking place this week at the Mt. Kisco Public Library. Children in grades one through six are eligible for this program.

### Brewster

**BREWSTER** — The Friends of the Brewster Public Library are offering a children's program this summer given by Alice Miller.

Using visual slides and artifacts, the program will cover African Tribes and their cultures. Registration will take place on July 8th, 10 a.m. at the Brewster Public Library.

### Mt. Pleasant

**PLEASANTVILLE** — Mt. Pleasant Public Library at 350 Bedford Road will be the scene of a variety of activities for children during the summer months. Programs will include story hours for three year olds and four through six year olds, films for three to five year olds and grades one through six, and a reading game for grades one through six.

The reading game "Cast a Ballot for Books" begins June 26 at both the Bedford Road

library and the Valhalla branch. After each child reads five books, he or she moves into the Mayor's house and casts a ballot for a favorite book. The Governor's mansion is the next move following reading of ten books with another ballot cast. After 15 books, the young reader moves to Washington and Congress. Over 20 books produces a move to the White House and the presidential office.

Each five books entitle the reader to another ballot cast for a favorite book. Following the conclusion of the game on September 1, a book list will be compiled on favorite books voted on throughout the period.

Hours for registration and reading reports will be Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to noon, 2 to 4:30 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. Fridays the hours will be 10 a.m. to noon and 2 to 4:30 p.m. There will be no reports on Saturdays.

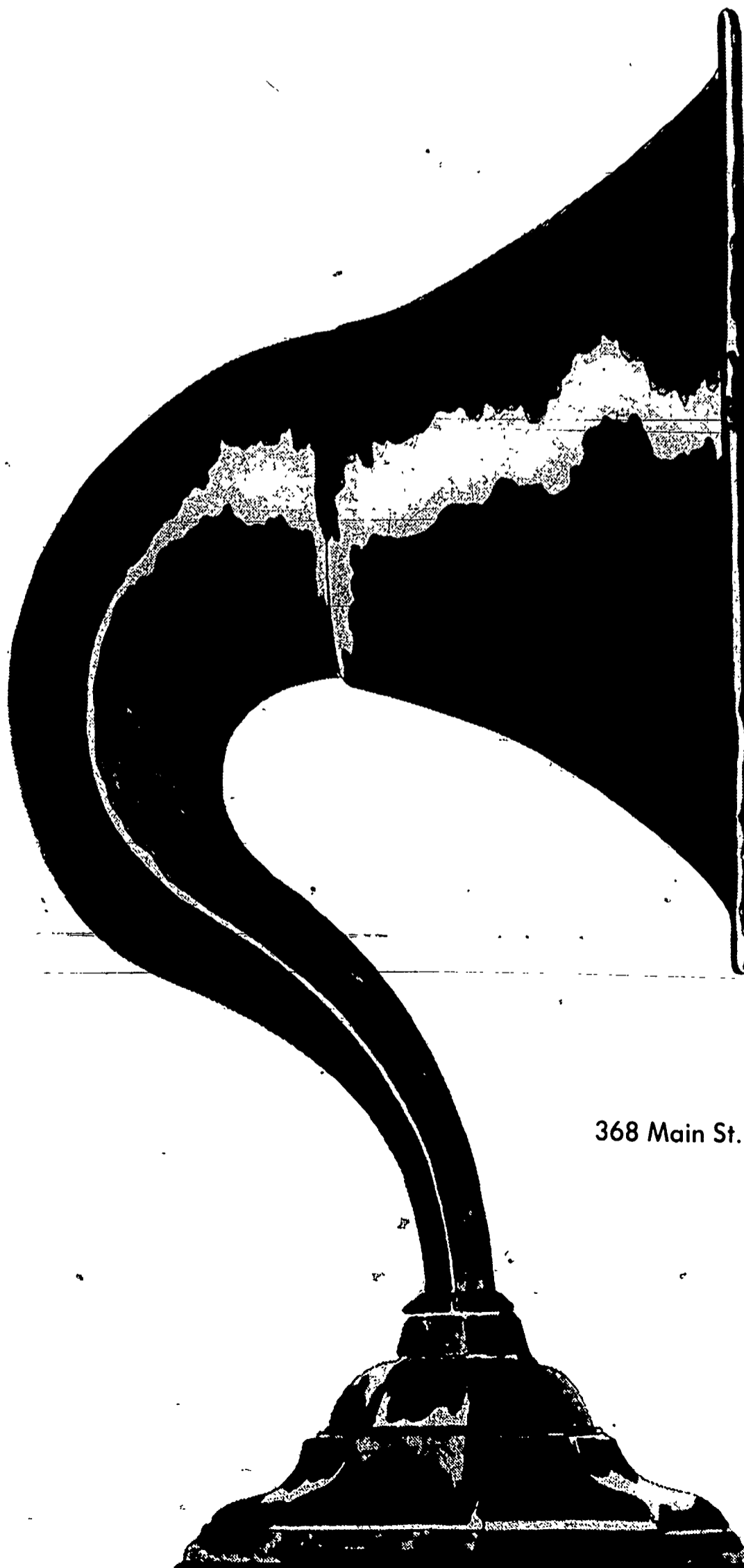
Story hours for three year olds will be held Friday mornings at 10 a.m. beginning June 30 and Fridays at 11 a.m. for four to six year olds. On Wednesday mornings at 10:30 a.m. films will be shown for three to five year olds beginning June 28 and continuing on July 12, 26, August 9 and 23. Films for grades one through six will be shown on Thursday afternoons at 2 p.m. and again at 3:30 p.m. on July 6, 20, August 3, 11 and 31.

The library will be open from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Saturdays during the month of July, but will be closed on Saturdays during August. The usual Saturday hours will be resumed the first Saturday after Labor Day.

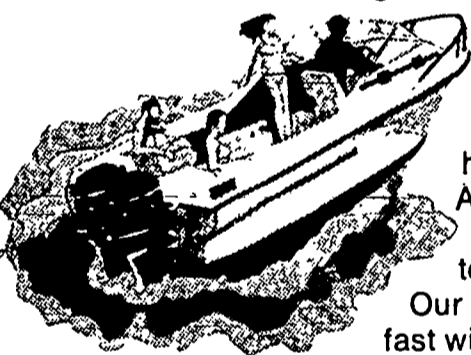

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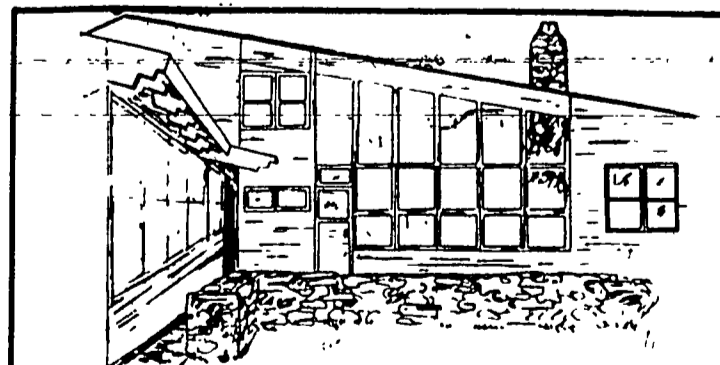
