FIFTY SEVEN years ago yesterday the Erie Canal was opened, what was regarded as the greatest engineering work in the United States having been completed after eight years of labor at a cost of \$7,602,000. De Witt Clinton, who died three years after its completion, should not have lain more than half a century in his grave, says the New York Mail and Express, before the erection of a costly monument in his honor as the father of the great work. By his persistence in urging the opening of the channel 363 miles long from Buffalo to Troy he contributed more than any other man has ever contributed to the might of the Empire State and to the growth of our city. For his services he deserves a statue in Central Park, and every anniversary of the opening of the canal should be observed with demonstrations in his honor. When the booming of cannon announced the union of Lake Erie and the Hudson, New York had a population of but 166,086, and a commerce inferior to that of Philadelphia. To-day its population is nearly 1,500,000, and its commerce is greater than that of Philadelphia, Boston, Baltimore and New Orleans combined. How much the Erie Canal has contributed to this growth it is difficult to realize, but its benefit to the whole State has been equally great.

THE BATAVIAN is informed that its political opponents "are incubating a 'secret circular' egg, which is to be hatched so near election time that the friends of the Republican candidates will have no opportunity to catch the chicken and wring its false and malicious neck before the votes are cast." The paragraph does not end where our quotation marks have stepped it, but continues, giving a description of the bird in language as elegant and choice as "Brick Pomeroy" was wont to use in the palmy days of his La Crosse Democrat. May be the Batavian, which seldom descends to use of vulgarities in expressing itself, finds it necessary to come down a peg or two, so as to reach the level of some of its party associates.

A LARGELY attended meeting of the Democratic State committee was held in New York yesterday. A characteristic letter was read from ex-Governor Tilden in which the old gentleman seems to take an almost childish pride in the references to his own administration. To the independent voters, says Mr. Tilden, "as well as to all others who are in general accord with me as to the principles on which the State ought to be governed, I cordially commend for their support Grover Cleveland and his associate candidates."

A LARGELY attended meeting was held at the Free Academy building in Rochester last evening for the purpose of forming a Civil Service Reform Association. President Anderson of the Rochester University presided. Dr. E. M. Moore, Theodore Bacon, the Rev. Max Landsberg, Charles Fitch, and J. Breck Perkins made addresses. Willard Brown, Corresponding Secretary of the New York association, explained the objects of the association. A permanent association was formed, with Dr. E. M. Moore as President; Charles E. Fitch, Gilman H. Perkins, James S. Aangle, the Rev. Max Landsberg, Lewis Ernest, Patrick Barry, and A. S. Mann as Vice-Presidents; Dr. Porter Farley, Secretary, and F. W. Elwood, Treasurer, with an executive committee of seven of which Theodore Bacon is chairman. Prominent members of both political parties participated. The association starts off with a membership of over 200.

ON ITS local page this week the Batavian talks temperance with all the ardor of a reformed drunkard who had just taken a nip to set his tongue wagging. It throws the odium for the disgraceful rows of the past few days on those who voted for what it calls the "whisky ticket," and yet this good cold water paper argues on its editorial page that the prohibition ticket should not be voted by temperance men. Pretty soon we shall expect to hear of Editor Lewis taking a drink himself. Even the best sometimes succumb to temptation.

An Astronomical Occurrence.

On December 6th, the transit of Venus over the sun's disc will take place, the remarkable occurrence being visible throughout the United States. The first contact will occur in this longitude, at 8:55 a. m., the second at 9:16 a. m., the third at 2:28 p. m., and the fourth at nearly 3 p. m. The last previous transit of Venus took place in 1874, and the next in order will not occur until the year 2117, the phenomenon occurring at intervals of 8 and 235 years alternately.
