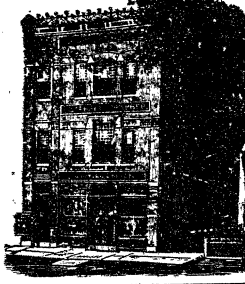

THE RAILROAD STRIKE.

THE SOLDIERS AND THE MOB ARE MEETING FREQUENTLY.

Capital and Labor's Battle—Chicago and Its Environs the Scene of a Bloody Contest for Supremacy—Views of the Situation.

Chicago, July 9.—Unless the present strike is settled by arbitration by 4 o'clock to-morrow afternoon most of the wage workers in this city will quit work at that hour.

Everything is quiet in the stock yards this morning.

The strike situation here is unchanged to-day, and in all probability blood will be shed before night.

Chicago, July 9.—General Master Workman Sovereign says: "The working people of the city have reached a point where they are determined to call the attention of the whole population to the present labor difficulties."

At noon the Mayor sent a telegram to the Governor asking for the aid of the militia.

President's Proclamation.

Washington, D. C., July 9.—President Cleveland last night issued a proclamation in which he says: "All good citizens and all persons who may be or may come within the city and State aforesaid against aiding, countenancing, encouraging or taking any part in such unlawful obstructions, demonstrations and assemblages; and I hereby warn all persons engaged in, or in any way connected with such unlawful obstructions, combinations and assemblages to disperse and retire peaceably to their respective abodes or to their places of business."
