

through different channels, from Marblehead, that one or more Fishermen had arrived from the Banks, which had been taken by the *Revenge*, on her passage from England, and informed that WAR WAS DECLARED AGAINST THIS COUNTRY.

IMPORTANT TO COMMERCE.

From Amsterdam, Sept. 14.
Vessels that have touched at England, which have been carried into England, are not allowed to discharge here. As soon as the cargo arrives, the different consignees of the cargo are obliged to give bonds to the value of the goods, that the vessel has not been in any of the English harbors. If should afterwards appear that the vessel has not been in England, then the bonds are given up; but if the contrary should be proved, the amount of the bonds must be immediately paid into the public treasury, and the cargo confiscated. The merchants, &c. & all, have refused to sign such bonds, and several vessels (Americans) now here, will probably be turned away.

We understand that the Court of Inquiry in the case of Commodore Barron, have closed their sittings; and the result of the investigation has been forwarded to the Secretary of the Navy.

The Secretary of the Treasury reports to the House of Representatives of the United States, that the net revenue arising from duties on merchandize and tonnage which accrued during the year 1805, amounted to \$4,135,138 dollars; during 1806, to 16,764,454; and that the net revenue during the three first quarters of 1807, exceeds that of the corresponding quarters in the year preceding. The permanent expenses, calculated on a peace establishment, are estimated at 11,600,000 dollars. Balance in the Treasury on the 30th day of September last, 8,530,000 dollars.

Orders were received on Monday from the department of War, to discharge Captain Leslie's company of artillery and Captain Reid's company of infantry; as these were the only companies of militia in actual service, their discharge has a pacific appearance. —*Norfolk Ledger.*

A report was current at Baltimore on Tuesday, that Gen. Wilkinson had been nominated Secretary of War, in place of General Dearborn, appointed Collector of the port of Boston. —*Mer. Adv.*

The National Intelligencer of Wednesday silent on the above.

Thomas Willing, Esq. having resigned the appointment of President of the Bank of the United States, David Lenox, Esq. has been unanimously elected to that office.

The Legislature of the state of Rhode-Island have appointed the Hon. Elisha Mathewson, a Senator to Congress, in place of James Fenner, Esq. elected Governor.

Considerable remittances have been recently made to the United States from England, for the purchase of pitch, tar, turpentine, rosin, hemp, canvass, some iron, pine boards and spars, masts and yards! —*Aurora.*

The Legislature of Maryland met at the city of Annapolis on Monday last [2d ult.] but we have as yet received no account of their proceedings. The Republican majority in the house of Delegates is nearly two to one this session. —*Repub. Adv.*

Quebec, October 19.
Yesterday arrived his Majesty's fine new frigate *Horatio*, of 38 guns, George Scott, Esq. Comander. She left Portsmouth on the 3d ult. In her came passengers, his Excellency Lieutenant-General Sir James Henry Craig, K. B. Captain-General and Commander in Chief, in and over the British provinces in North America. His Excellency's suite consisted of Lt. Colonel E. Baynes, of the 4th Garrison Batt. Adjutant-General; Major William Thornton, York Rangers; Military Secretary and first Aid-de-Camp; Lieutenant E. Deven, 4th Garrison Battalion; Captain A. Ker, 43d Regiment, Lieutenant M. Maccay, 20th Regiment, Aids-de-Camp. In the *Horatio* came 50 Artillerymen, which are all the troops we are to expect from England this fall.

In the past week the 49th and 100th Regiments, with a detachment of Artillery, embarked for Montreal, in consequence of the arrival of the 98th and Newfoundland Infencible Regiments. The greater part are come up. Two transports yet remain to make their appearance.

On the 14th instant, several Companies of the 49th Regiment and of the 100th, embarked for Montreal.

The court of Algeiras has been suspended, and all trials are hereafter to take place in Madrid.

We learn from Marseilles, that the Algeres lost in a late action, in which they were defeated by the Tunisians, 30,000 men killed, 4,000 made prisoners, 500 Arabian women, 500 wounded, 26 brass pieces of cannon, 6 mortars, 500 tents, 5,000 mules,

10,000 camels, 10,000 small arms, 1,000 quintals of powder, 2,000 shells, 5,000 axes, 20 pair of gold mounted pistols set with diamonds, 20 sabres in the same order, 16 Constantinian mares richly apperelled and valued at 50,000 dollars, with three chests of money in gold and other coin.

Captain Brian, who arrived this forenoon in 18 days from St. Croix, informs that 30 days before he sailed, two British frigates came in close under the forts at West End, and cut out 5 or 6 full of American vessels, and took them to Tortola, among them was the brig St. Croix Packet, of Philadelphia which had been released, had retained, and was to sail for Philadelphia next day. — Capt. Brian was boarded shortly after he came out by a British frigate, but permitted to proceed. —*N. Y. Gazette.*

Davis Floyd, who was lately convicted of a misdemeanor as a party in Burr's conspiracy, has been sentenced to a fine of ten dollars and three hours imprisonment. He has since been appointed clerk to the legislature of the Indiana territory.

His excellency the governor of Maryland has issued his Proclamation offering a reward of Five Hundred Dollars for the apprehension of John Whirlow, alias John Rigging, who lately attempted to assassinate Judge James B. Robins, on his return from Caroline county court. —*Repub. Adv.*

On the 3d instant, at a special court held for the purpose at Cautkill, John Williams, for the murder of John Scott, in that village a few weeks past, was found guilty, and sentenced to be hanged on Friday the 18th of December next. James S. Stiles and Archibald McClary, were also tried for the murder and acquitted, but remained for trial as accessories after the fact. Judge Van Ness presided. —*See.*

At the late sittings of the court of special sessions of the peace for the city and county of New-York, Jacob Felter, of the United States navy, who had been convicted of an assault upon Robert Bickellev, was fined 30 dollars and costs, and received a severe admonition from the bench to be careful in future how he employed those weapons which were put into his hands for the defence of his country only.

New-Orleans, October 5.
Gun-boat, No. 15, Lt. Ballard, sailed for the Balize on Monday last; whence it is understood she will proceed to cruise off in the Gulf. We believe this is the first boat ordered on our coast.

At a court martial held on board of the U. S. ketch *Fiona*, in this harbor on the 8th day of June last, by order of the Hon. the Secretary of the navy for the trial of William Rogers, surgeon, for disobedience of orders and un-officer-like conduct.

It was decreed that the said Wm. Rogers "should be dismissed the service, and rendered incapable of ever serving therein;" which sentence has been confirmed by the president of the United States.

Extract of a letter received by a gentleman in New York, from his correspondent in Norfolk, dated 4th November.

"The long expected duel between our friend McConico and captain Gordon, of the Chesapeake frigate, took place a few days since in Carolina. The first fire, at the distance of eight paces, was without effect. In the second, at six paces, both were wounded; McConico slightly in the thigh, the ball passing through the fleshy part; but Gordon is said to be very seriously and alarming. The ball lodged in the upper part of the thigh, near the groin. The business, I fear, will not terminate without the interference of the civil authority, or the removal of the Chesapeake."

A German Author, who has lately published some statistical observations respecting the state of Europe, says, that Europe contains 173,396 square German miles, of which France either governs directly or protects 38,893; that it contains 132,509,000 inhabitants, of which 37,050,000 obey France, or enter into its Federal system; that there are in Europe 2,549,836 soldiers, of which France can put 854,800 in movement. The total revenues of Europe he estimates at 1,173,750,000 florins, of which France receives about 700,000,000 of livres, equal to thirty millions sterling.

From a Philadelphia Paper.

A letter from a gentleman at Columbia, received at Northumberland, (Penn.) dated the 6th instant says—"Last night about 8 o'clock, a shocking accident took place here—A boy of Mr Broomfield's went into the store and got too near the powder keg with the candle, and by a spark from it an awful explosion took place, which burnt the boy so much that he died this morning. Mr. Broomfield's store was in the two story brick house on the corner of the lot next to Mr. Miller's—the front and most of the end of the house was blown up, with every article in the store; the windows of most of the adjoining houses were broke, some at the distance of sixty yards. Two women and three children were got out of the ruins after the house had fell, and providentially without receiving any material injury."

Singular Duel.—We learn from undoubted authority, that some time since while the British frigate *Jason* was at Trinidad, a duel was fought on board of her between two mulatto girls, one named Grace, a servant to Madam Villeneuve, and Miss Charlotte. The latter was killed on the spot, and Miss Grace was slightly wounded in her right shoulder. The Lieutenant who had the command of the quarter-deck, was broke for suffering fire arms to be put into their hands. The battle between them commenced by pulling caps, but was actually terminated as here stated. —*N. Y. Gaz.*
