

Rock Feb. 15. in company with a
60 sail of American vessels, all of which
were bound to ports in the United States.
Yesterday evening as the Packet Experi-
ence for Hudson, was getting under way,
the battery, during a squall, she was
sunk with lightning, and her mast much
shattered. There were upwards of 40 pas-
sengers on board, eight of whom were ladies,
no person was injured. All the glass on
board was broken, and the locks on some
of the doors melted by the electric fluid
which scattered itself through the vessel in
every direction.
The *Triumph*, Sir Thomas Hardy, arriv-
ing in Bermuda, on the 19th February from
Chesapeake.
The French frigate *Patriot*, which left
Chesapeake Bay on the 16th December, ar-
rived in the road of the Isle of Aix on the
17th Jan. The captain informs, that he met
10 leagues from land, the English ship
Prosperity, Capt. Anderson, from Ireland to
New-York, without rudder, sails, or masts,
days the sport of the waves, with bread
preserved. The seas ran so high, that
nothing but the utmost desire to save these
happy men, could have induced capt.
Anderson to have put out his boat.
He happily succeeded in saving the lives
of 48 men who were reduced to despair.

Andero, informs that the embargo in
France and the ports of her allies was taken
off on the 21st Jan. The emperor Napole-
on was momentarily expected at Bordeaux—
markets in France and Spain for colonial pro-

The London "Sun," of the 17th Februa-
ry states it as most probable, that a duty of
6d. and 6d. per bushel will be laid on the ex-
portation of salt from Great-Britain.
The Legislature of Delaware have disap-
proved the Vermont resolution, making the
edges removable on an address.
The Duke of Manchester, the new gover-
nor of Jamaica, arrived at that Island on the
2th of February.
The bank of England has granted a loan
of three millions to government, without in-
terest during the war.
The British King was so well the 4th Feb.
to have a public levee.
According to Steel's list for February, the
British fleet then in commission, consisted
of 141 sail of the line, 22 frigates, 167 fri-
gates, 216 sloops, &c. and 221 gun-brigs and
cutters.—Total in commission, 767.—Those
ordinary and building, make the whole
number 1072.
