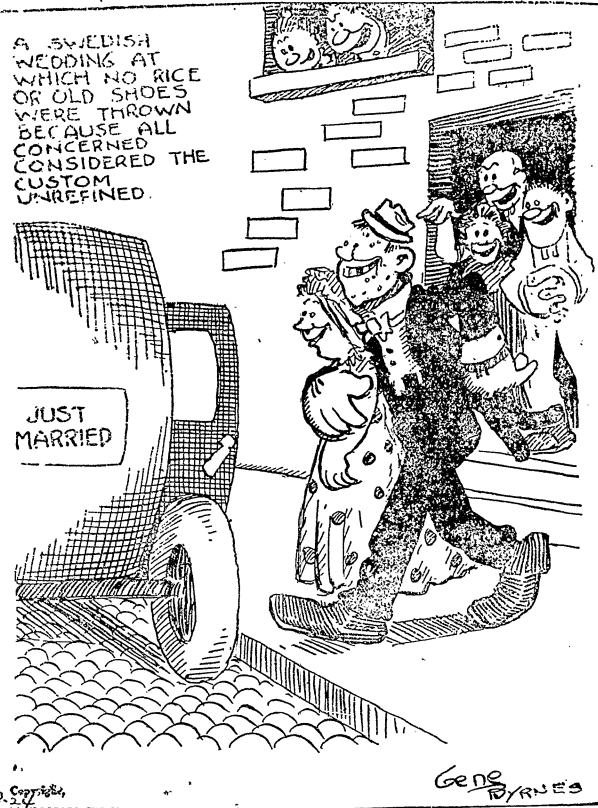

ject is to trample on the rights of that same electorate. It should be observed that the man who gives utterance to this foolish fiction is the same who steadfastly maintained that the Hohenzollerns had international right on their side in the World War.

The fairness and decency of Robert Marion La Follette are impressively illustrated by his advocacy in New York of what is perhaps his favorite theme, the alleged need of shackling the Supreme Court of the United States. With regard to our highest court he said:

Either the court must be the final arbiter of what the law is or else some means must be found to correct its decisions. If the court is the final and conclusive authority to determine what laws Congress may pass, then obviously the court is the real ruler of the country exactly the same as the most absolute king would be.

All which is demagogic nonsense of the rarest kind. In every country on earth where democratic or other liberal government prevails, some court is the final arbiter of all disputes arising under national law, and many minor courts are the final arbiters of other disputes of local or limited gravity. But it is ridiculous to claim that they are the "real rulers" within their respective jurisdictions.

Not a single one of these agencies whereby an "absolute king" enforces his will is confided to the Supreme Court of the United States. The function of the Supreme Court is not to determine "what laws Congress may pass." Its function is to determine, when the question is raised, whether, in the adoption of some given legislative measure, Congress has observed the metes and bounds established by our Constitution—the charter of our democracy—for the control of the Executive, the Congress and the Judiciary alike. For every Supreme Court, not on its volition but by the initiative of their hundreds of other Federal laws are passed and go into effect, and are scrupulously respected by the mass of people, without any intervention whatsoever by the Supreme Court. Furthermore, in passing upon the constitutionality of legislation in the Federal sphere, the Supreme Court upholds far more laws than it invalidates.

This judicial system has been in force for 135 years. It has remained for Senator La Follette to discover that the power of interpretation exercised by the Supreme Court is as despotic as that of an "absolute king."

The judges of this court are appointed by the President. Their number is subject to the discretionary authority of Congress. They are removable by the process of impeachment by the House and conviction by the Senate. If these constitutional provisions are a mark of absolutism, then senior Senator from Wisconsin is a preternaturally discerning man, the immortal farmers of the Constitution were really fools, and the American people, who in the long span of more than a century and a quarter have failed to throw out their judicial tyrants by constitutional amendment, deserve not the blessings of political freedom.

CANCER RESORT LOST IN FLAMES

Highland, Sept. 25.—Damage of \$25,000 was caused by fire of unknown origin which destroyed Dwyer Institute on the Clintondale road at 3 o'clock on Wednesday morning. The local fire department responded to an alarm, but found the flames enveloping the second story of the building when they arrived and could do nothing. Three persons who were in the building escaped by a ladder which was leaning against a window sill. A Dwyer of New York conducted the place as a health resort for cancer patients. Seven patients had left the institute Tuesday but more were expected. Dr. J. E. Pasternak of 225 E. 19th street, New York city, was the physician in charge, and visited the patients four times a week. The building was owned by Joseph and L. Brown of Milton, who leased it to Dwyer.

BONUS MILL IS WORKING FULL BLAST

Washington, Sept. 25.—Bonus applications are being ground rapidly through the adjusted compensation payment machinery and are now commencing to arrive at the Veterans Bureau, their final approval point, at the rate of 10,000 a day. O. W. Clark, chief of the adjusted compensation division announced today.

So far 130,000 applications have reached the bureau and at the present rate it is estimated 2,000,000 applications will have been received and put in shape for the issuance of certificates by January 1, the date set in the Bonus Act. Cash payments of the \$50 maximum start March 1, 1925. The compensation division with its personnel of 200, the army division,

with 2,000, navy with 200 and marine corps with 45, are functioning smoothly and there is little fear of any last minute rush causing delay or congestion, Clark said.

Four million certificates engraved in Green and Gold on silk fiber paper, costing \$210,000 are now in process of manufacture in the bureau of engraving and printing. The first of these are to be delivered to the bureau Saturday and a large staff is ready to begin filling them out immediately.
