

have determined him to dispatch the Orders above-mentioned to repair the Damages they may have received, as soon as the Acts which are expected upon the Facts set forth in the Memorial shall be seen; so his Majesty cannot but procure to his own Subjects the Security they ought to have, according to the same Treaties and the Rights of Nations, in case that on the Part of Great Britain, by any sinister Persuasion, or for want of understanding the true Meaning of the Treaties, any thing contrary to them has been committed or attempted to be committed.

May 24. This Morning between 6 and 7 the Princess of Wales was happily deliver'd of a Prince at Norfolk House St. James's Square, the Archbishop of Canterbury being present. At 5 Lord Baltimore was sent to Kensington to acquaint his Majesty that the Princess was in Labour, and about 8 the Marquis of Carnarvon was sent in State to notify to his Majesty her Royal Highness's Delivery, and the good State the Princess and her Son were in.

Mr. Cannon of Jermin-street, laid her Royal Highness, who the Evening before had been walking with the Prince in St. James's Park.

May 31. Near Pullholy in Carnarvonsh, a Woman aged 72, was lately delivered of a Son, and both like to do well; and at Taurin in Montgomery, a Woman was delivered of 3 Sons at a Birth, and all living.

June 22. Last Night a most elegant and magnificent Firework was play'd off in St. James's Square in Celebration of the Christning of the young Prince. In the Center of the Basin was erected a fine transparent Obelisk, 40 Foot high, adorn'd with various Designs, Arms, Mottoes, &c.

On the Base was represented;

1. *Hymen* presenting the new born Prince to *Britannia*, with this Motto, *Nato Caesar Festus.*
2. *Minerva* educating the young Prince, the Ensigns of Arts and Arms lying by, Motto, *Hæ ubi Artes.*
3. The Prince conducted by *Time* receiving the Crown from the Hands of *Britannia*, Motto, *Aderit jam Tempus.*
4. The Prince on the Throne supported by *Liberty* and *Justice*, Plenty with her Cornucopia kneeling before him, Motto, *Patriis Virtutibus.*

Open Lights disposed in a beautiful manner, at the Top of which was placed a transparent Star, and the whole crown'd with thick feathers: On Wings which projected from the Angles of the Obelisk, were various Fireworks. At the Corners of the Base play'd four fine Fire Wheels, above were placed four Orange Trees in Vases adorn'd with golden Fruit, which burst off in Fire, while four Brilliant Fountains play'd out of the midst of the Trees. Above these; in the middle of a Circle of Tapers; on each Wing arose four more Fountains of Fire, while another discharg'd itself from the Feathers at top twenty Foot high, and descended in a Brilliant Shower. From out the Star a Firework was discharg'd; which overspread great Part of the Square, and at last a Mine was sprung, which in an Instant destroy'd the beautiful Pageant. During the playing of these Works, were several Discharges of fine Rockets and Cannon, Healths were drank, accompanied with Kettle Drums, Trumpets, &c; while the People, who were very numerous, express'd their Joy on this Happy Occasion in the loudest Acclamations. The basin was surrounded with large Tapers; the Light of which striking on the Frame of the Obelisk, which was all gilt, had an exceeding fine Effect: The Rails and the Stone Pyramids were illuminated around with a vast number of Lights finely disposed. But what added much to the Beauty of the Design, was, that every thing was ordered in so careful and regular a manner, that no Damage could accrue to any of the Spectators.

June 24. The King having left the Christning of the new-born Prince entirely to the Discretion of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; His Royal Highness chose his Most Sacred Majesty his Royal Father, together with the King of Sweden, and the Queen of Prussia, to be Sponsors: The Duke of Queensberry and Dover represented the King; the Lord Baltimore the King of Sweden; and the Lady Irwin the Queen of Prussia; the Prince was baptiz'd by the Names of **GEORGE WILLIAM-FREDRICK.**
