

London, July 27. There are now 86 Men of War in Commission.

Yesterday there was a Rumour upon the Exchange that Gibraltar was actually Invested with 20,000 Men; and that a small Skirmish had happen'd between the Garrison and the Spaniards; but we can give no Credit thereto.

The Rulers of the Company of Watermen have received Orders to supply the Government in 20 Days with 1000 able Seamen.

We hear that Orders have been sent to all the Lords Lieutenants of Counties, for Impressing Men for the Sea Service in their respective Provinces.

Yesterday it was talk'd in the City, that an Embargo would be laid on the Shipping in Order to Transport some Troops to the Mediterranean. It is Impossible to express the Joy which appeared among the Generality of People on Thursday, on the Hopes of a War with the Spaniards, to Revenge the Robberies, Murders and Insults committed on the British Subjects for Years past.

Dublin, August 5. Three Ships are here taking in Provisions to sail with the Soldiers order'd for Gibraltar,

B O S T O N, October 2.

Last Tuesday Evening arrived here Capt. Cowley in a Ship from Antigua, by whom we are inform'd, That in the Month of July they had such excessive Rains, as that their Crops were greatly Damaged thereby, so that but few Vessels were like to get freights. That on or about the 17th of August past, they had a very severe Storm, or Hurricane, which had done considerable Damage among the Shipping, and particularly that a Ship belonging to Piscataqua, Capt. Pappou Commander, being full freighted with 400 Hogheads of Sugar, and just ready to sail, was drove ashore from her Anchors and stove in Pieces, and all the Cargo, except about 50 Hogheads, lost. That after the Storm was over, they were informed by some Vessels which arrived there, that several Wrecks both of Ships and Sloops were seen floating upon the Seas; and 'twas feared that vast Damage was done by the same Storm in most of the Leeward-Islands, especially those to the Northward of Antigua, where it seem'd to be most violent.
