

Harman V. Hart, in lumber, amounts to between 3 and 4000 dollars, on which there was no insurance. Bernard, Marvin & Nelson, also lost lumber to a large amount, but it was insured. Mr. Hart's yard was on the north of the factory, and that of B. M. & N. on the south. Great quantities of lumber were thrown into the basin and river. The engines were kept almost constantly employed throughout yesterday, on the piles of lumber, and it was with great difficulty that they prevented the flames from spreading.

It was extremely difficult for the engines to approach the fire; if there had been a floating engine, property to the amount of thousands, would have been saved, which, for the want of it, was destroyed.

The National Intelligencer announces the death of Richard W. Meade, Esq. Mr. Meade was the gentleman who was so long imprisoned in Spain, and has been pressing, for years, but in vain, his great, and in our humble opinion, just claims upon the Government.—N. Y. Com. Adv.

We are sorry to learn from a traveller, says the National Intelligencer, that the Cumberland road is in a state of dilapidation. It is already in many places impassable. Without some permanent provision by Congress for keeping it in repair, by means of tolls, or otherwise, the whole expenditure upon it, will soon be lost to the country. The measures of erecting toll-gates upon it has been heretofore objected to, in Congress, on the ground that it would conflict with the rights of the States. During the last session of her Legislature, the State of Pennsylvania, as far as her rights are concerned, gave the coup-de-grace to this objection, having no idea of having her rights "restored?" by the wanton neglect of the means of preserving this grand and useful public work.

From the Saratoga Sentinel, July 1. Warm Weather.—The mercury in a thermometer kept in the office of Doct. Steel, of this village, rose on Saturday to 95 degrees. It has never been known before to rise, in the same situation, more than 92 degrees.—The heat, indeed, of the previous day had been so great, that three stage horses were found dead on Saturday morning.

A gentleman in this village, who keeps a rain gauge, informs us that the quantity of rain which has fallen since the 30th of March last, is sixteen inches.

Effects of Lightning.—The shower of Saturday afternoon extended about 40 miles along the Jersey shore, and in some places did considerable injury. Two barns at Middletown, N. J. were struck by lightning, and one of them was burnt to the ground.

The town of Huntsville, Alabama, was visited on the night of the 10th ult., with a tremendous thunder storm commencing at 9 P. M., and continuing without intermission until after day break. Much damage was done to the trees and crops.

During a severe thunder storm on the 24th ult. in Charlotte Vermont, four horses attached to two wagons employed in transporting goods from McNeil's Ferry, were instantly struck dead by lightning. The men driving the horses had left them but a moment before, to take shelter under a shed a few rods distant, and thus escaped uninjured.
