The resignation of James Watkins, grade six teacher at Bolivar Central School for the past nine years, was accepted with regrets by the local Board of Education at last week's session.

Mr. Watkins has accepted a post as elementary supervisor at the Oswayo Valley Joint School in Shinglehouse, Pa.

Accepted on provisional appointments were Mrs. Stephen Paytash of Little Genesee as half-day Kindergarten teacher; and Clark Jacques to succeed Mrs. Bernard Fox as a sixth grade instructor. Mrs. Paytash is a graduate of Houghton College, and Mr. Jacques, a 1961 graduate of BCS, has completed studies at the University of Cincinnati and State University College at Genesee.

Board president George W. Bliss reappointed committees for the coming year. Named were: John D. Bradley and Merton Dunshie, transportation; Mrs. Fenton Yehl and Richard Pounds, cafeteria; Mr. Bradley and Mrs. Yehl, teachers; and Mr. Pounds and Mr. Dunshie, building and grounds.

Bids for cafeteria supplies for the coming year were accepted from: Beverly Farms Inc. of Portville, ice cream products; Stroehmann Bros. of Olean, baked goods; Evergreen Dairy of Bolivar, milk; and Flickinger (Red & White) of Buffalo, canned goods.

Permission was given for the local Little League to use a school bus for a trip to a baseball game in Rochester.

Stipends were approved for 11 teachers who successfully completed a two-week language arts workshop in Angelica.

The goal of \$1,000 to finance Christmas decorations for Bolivar's Main St. has been reached, members of the Bolivar Betterment Association learned Monday night.

Necessary funds were realized through a series of public fund raising activities, initiated by Mrs. Doris Shaner and Mrs. Marge Kalkhof. John Baker and Robert Thomas were appointed to complete details of the Yuletide lighting project.

It was decided 10 strings of lights, 175 feet apart, will be strung across Main St. The bulbs have been ordered, and one of the guy wires installed. Bolivar had no Christmas lighting in 1964, as the old decorations were in a state of disrepair and there were no funds to purchase new ones.

Future costs of the lighting project will be for installation and additions and repairs.

The Association made these committee assignments at its first full session: publicity, Bernard Hilton, chairman, to be aided by Robert Schmettler; Miss Marjorie Cranston and William Jones; Christmas home lighting, Donald Saunders, chairman, and Mr. Baker and Mr. Thomas; clean-up, Robert Morris, chairman, with Harold Cossaboon and Kenneth Stedman; Main St. Christmas decorations, Mrs. Shaner chairman, with Mrs. Kalkhof, charter president.

Among future events planned is an old fashioned sidewalk bazaar with local merchants participating, on Aug. 27.

The 21 members attending learned a showcase window in the Hogan Building has been made available to display products manufactured locally. Eugene Kuhn was named chairman of the display project.

Next Association meeting will be 8 p.m. Sept. 20 at the Bolivar Hotel.

Collision Injures Three

A two-car collision Tuesday night on Rt. 17 in the Town of Genesee resulted in injuries for three persons.

Robert Brushingham, 18, of Olean, driving a 1959-model sedan, sustained a neck injury. Charles Craddock, 34, of Little Genesee, operating a 1957-model station wagon, suffered a fractured left arm and scalp lacerations. William Aaron, 33, of Portville, passenger in the Brushingham auto, was treated for a left arm laceration and neck injury.

All were taken to Olean General Hospital. Only Mr. Brushingham remained hospitalized Wednesday, and his condition was listed as "good."

On-The-Job Training Will Be Offered In Bolivar, Says Goodell

Congressman Charles E. Goodell has announced approval by the U. S. Department of Labor of a Manpower On-the-Job project in Bolivar. Training will be conducted by the Hahn and Schaffner Company here.

The project will provide five unemployed and underemployed workers with 26 weeks' each of training as lathe operators. Project was developed and submitted to the secretary of Labor for approval by the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training, and will cost a total of \$3,462.

The Manpower Development and Training Act was authored by Congressman Goodell as a substitute for the Administration's proposal passed into law in 1962. It provides training and allowances to permit the trainee to support himself while learning on-the-job skills.

Since the law was enacted, programs have been conducted in all 50 states, resulting in about 75 per cent employment for those receiving the training.
