Russell Prickett, an international economist in the U.S. State Department's Bureau of Economic Affairs, will speak at an Ogdensburg bankers and businessmen's breakfast at Gran View, No. 9.

Prickett's appearance was arranged by the Associated Colleges of the St. Lawrence Valley, an organization which includes Potsdam State, St. Lawrence University, Clarkson College and Canton ATC.

Prickett's topic will be "The Formation of U.S. Economic Policy." He will also speak to various classes at Wadhams Hall.

Prickett is the international economist in the Special Trade Activities and Commercial Treaties Division of the State Department's Bureau of Economic Affairs.

A brief biography of Prickett follows: Russell Prickett was born in Minnesota in 1932 and attended Hamline University (B.A.), Harvard University (L.B.) and is doing graduate work in economics at the University of Oklahoma. He is a member of the Minnesota Bar.

Prickett joined the Department of State in 1959 and has served at the U.S. Mission to the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna, Austria; the American Consulate in Basel, Switzerland; on the Disarmament Advisory Staff, United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency; and as Commercial Attaché in the American Embassy in Belgrade, Yugoslavia. He is presently an International Economist in the Special Trade Activities and Commercial Treaties Division in the State Department's Bureau of Economic Affairs.
