Contract Holders Required To List Job Openings

New York City — The Division of Employment of the New York State Labor Department today reminded all firms holding Federal Government contracts that a new regulation requires virtually all of their job openings to be listed with the State Employment Service.

Federal Executive Order number 11598 applies to firms holding contracts issued, or renewed, on or since Sept. 24. It is aimed at providing increased job opportunities for veterans and will result in thousands of new job listings with Employment Service offices. Vietnam-era veterans are to be given first exposure to such job vacancies.

Employers affected by this legislation are prime contractors engaged in the performance of federal contracts, and their first-tier subcontractors. Jobs covered include those in the following categories: production and non-production, plant and office, supervisory and nonsupervisory, technical, and professional and administrative openings with a salary of less than \$18,000 a year. Included are full time, temporary and part-time jobs.

The regulation exempts the listing of openings a contractor fills from within his organization or through established collective bargaining agreements.

Employers are required to file periodic reports with the Employment Service indicating the number of persons who were hired during the reporting period and the number of those who were Vietnam-era veterans.

Further information can be obtained from all local New York State Employment Service offices.

Seaway Inspection Commenced

MASSENA — Representatives of seven leading consulting design engineering firms, invited by the Saint Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation to propose designs for ice control in the Seaway, were briefed Tuesday on current developments and began an inspection of Seaway facilities.

"In order that navigation in the Seaway system can be economically extended into the ice season it is necessary that modifications be made to structures and methods now employed," according to John D. Officer, Director of Comprehensive Planning for the Corporation.

"Some modifications have been made since the 27-foot Seaway channel as constructed and others are in various stages of design."

Conceptual designs are being solicited by the Seaway Corporation for methods and devices, which will permit navigation through a controlled ice cover on the Seaway shipping channel without producing effects unacceptable to other interests. Additional designs are desired for facilitating the handling of broken ice in and through the Seaway locks and inhibiting the formation of ice on the structure and its equipment.

The inspection of the facilities and the proposals of the engineering firms' representatives are major factors in the season extension effort and the development program of the Seaway Corporation and the U.S. Department of Transportation.
