

CHARLIE MURRAY IN "THE HEAD MAN" IS RIOT OF FUN

First National Player Has Human and Appealing Role in New Comedy

Charlie Murray is in town! For years—even before the genial genius of stage, screen and vaudeville comedy made his debut in split-reel "mirthquakes" of the silversheet, that announcement has had special meaning. To adults, children, folks of all ages and both sexes, it was the equivalent of saying: "The circus is here!"

In "The Head Man," at the Strand Theatre, however, there is a new and even more appealing Charlie Murray.
