CABINET MEETING—ARMY PROMOTIONS.
— WEATHER INDICATIONS — THE
HEAT STILL INTENSE EAST AND
WEST—INDICTED FOR MURDER.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The cabinet has been in session for about an hour. No business of extraordinary importance was transacted. The question of appointing a Surveyor for New York was not considered.

The President leaves to-night to attend the soldier's reunion at Newark, Ohio, accompanied by Gen. Sherman and Devens. The President will spend Sunday in Columbus.

The Tribune says: It has been discovered that the section in the army bill stopping promotion is not what its framers designed it to be. The matter has been referred to the Attorney General.

Weather indications: Partly cloudy, occasional rain, warm veering to colder winds.

MERIDEN, Conn., July 19. F. Worren, engineer of the Wilcox Silver Plate Co., fell while starting his engine this morning, overcome by the heat. He died in an hour.

John Morrissey, engineer of the plating department of the Merriden Britannia Co. was overcome by heat.

The thermometer is 98°.

ST. LOUIS, July 19.—The high hopes entertained that the heated term was about to break up were blasted this morning. The mercury has shown but about half a degree lower temperature than yesterday. There is considerable breeze, however, but it is more cloudy and sultry.

At the dispensary this morning there were five cases of sunstroke treated. Up to 11 o'clock there were no fatal cases. The total number of prostrations yesterday die not exceed 55, the larger portion being slight.

But one additional case of sunstroke has been taken to the Dispensary since 11 o'clock. The thermometer was 95½ at 1 o'clock, 2½ degrees less than yesterday. The indications are that the intensity of the heat has spent itself.

FROM ABROAD.

GORTSCHAKOFF RETURNS TO ST. PETERSBURG.—INSULT TO THE BRITISH FLAG.—DERBY'S DISCLOSURES.—TROOPS FOR THE FRENCH STRIKE.—NEW RAILROAD.

BERLIN, July 19.—Gortschakoff has returned to St. Petersburg, instead of going to Wildbad, as intended. It is reported that he goes to St. Petersburg to oppose the intrigues for his own overthrow and Schouvaloff's promotion.

Todleben promised to send an officer specially to the Gulf of Saros to make inquiries concerning the affair. He said he was sure that the superior officers of the Russian army in that district were ignorant of the attack upon the boat.

A Berlin dispatch announces that Russia proposes to appoint diplomatic agents at various points in Asiatic Turkey to watch Russian interests.

Russia is also making efforts to secure the early construction of the proposed railroad from Osenburg into Central Asia—200 German miles. The money will be raised by a loan.

LONDON, July 19.—The Marquis of Hartington gave notice to the Commons that he would soon call attention to the papers relating to the Eastern question.

Smith, First Lord of the Admiralty, said that Admiral Hornby telegraphs that the flag captain of the British fleet in the Aegean sea has had an interview with General Todleben, who stated that he had heard nothing of the firing into the British man-of-war boat. Todleben extremely regretted the occurrence.

All the morning papers excepting the News comment favorably on Beaconsfield's speech.

The Times thinks Derby violated his rights and customs, which it is desirable to uphold, in making public his recollections of the discussions of the Cabinet.

It is reported that two parties of railroad experts under direction of the government will examine the Tigris and Euphrates valleys for the best railway route to Persia.

PARIS, July 19.—The Cabinet has decided to send as many troops as possible to Auzin, the scene of he collier's strike.
