TELEGRAPHIC NOTES.

A Glance at the World's News.

During a dispute early yesterday morning E. J. Knee, of Concord, N. H., shot Wm. Murphy fatally. Knee claims that it was accidental.

The first shipment of horses from America for the use of the French army has arrived. The French military inspector is much pleased.

Intelligence has been received in St. Petersburg that the family of the Ameer of Afghanistan have taken refuge in Russian Turkistan.

W. C. Barber, while hunting in the mountains in the southeastern part of West Virginia, was frozen to death last week.

The Homeopathic Commission investigating the yellow fever epidemic in New Orleans, declare it both imported and indigenous. A discriminatory quarantine is recommended.

A dispatch from Darmstadt reports that the Grand Duchess of Hesse is seriously ill with diphtheria. She is Princess Alice, second daughter and third child of Queen Victoria.

The World says that Congressman Willis proposes to bring Dana, of the Sun, as a witness before the Naval Committee of the House, and afford him an opportunity to tell what he knows about fraudulent constructions in the navy.

The miners and laborers at May, Audenreid & Co.'s Buck Ridge colliery, Shamokin, Pa., have struck for an advance of wages. The strike throws 200 men and boys out of employment.

The New York Sun says the opinion is expressed that of the twenty-eight or thirty million trade dollars exported to China within five years all but one or two million have been "chopped" or delaced by the marks of Chinese bankers, and thus rendered uncurrent here.

In connection with the proposed transfer of the Indians various tribes recently held councils with a view of ascertaining the feelings on the subject. About 96 per cent of the Indians expressed themselves as against the transfer.

The New York Times says Secretary Sherman has informed Mr. Glover that he will not be permitted to ransack the Treasury records indiscriminately, but that facilities for obtaining information on any particular matter will be afforded.

It is rumored that proceedings are being taken by a party of the largest holders of Delaware, Lackawana & Essex R. R. The company operates, as lessee, some twelve minor roads, every one of which runs at considerable loss. On the Morris & Essex the loss last year was \$1,210,000.

Last Saturday Frisby Parsons's leg was caught between the heated rollers at the rolling mill in Wilmington, Del., and he was drawn in, crushed flat and roasted to death.

The sultan has assured Count Zichy, Austro-Hungarian Ambassador at Constantinople, of the Porte's intention to adhere to the Treaty of Berlin, and expressed great anxiety to arrive at a friendly understanding with Austria.

The Oatka Creek.

A correspondent of the Albany *Sunday Press*, contributes the following concerning the Oatka or Allan's creek, which is of local interest: "This stream runs very nearly through the centre of our beautiful village, Le Roy. I was introduced by Hon. Jarvis M. Hatch, of Rochester, to Ely S. Parker, (Ha-sa-no-an-da) an educated Seneca Indian, and Chief of the Tonawanda. At this time he was a member of 'the bar' at Rochester. I found him a most agreeable gentleman and learned in Indian lore. He at once took up his pen, when I asked him what was the name of Allan's creek before Allan settled upon its banks, and wrote in a full round hand "O-at-ka," which word means "Leaving the high lands or approaching an opening." I still hold the paper in my possession. The stream takes its rise in "the highlands" of Wyoming in the vicinity of Portage and makes its confluence with the Genesee river at Scottsville. The valley, from which the river derived its name was by the Iroquois called "the opening" to the Lake of Ontario. Through my instrumentality the name of Allan's creek was changed to O-at-ka. It is now known by no other name, and so appears upon the maps.

Mrs McBeath's son returned to Cleveland after a season of work as a boatman on the lakes, and she was very happy to see him at home again.
