Ambrose Stevens.

Whose death occurred at Lexing-
ton, Kentucky, December 10th, was
born in Batavia, N. Y., March 27th,
1807. He was a graduate of Devoe
College, Geneva, and also Union
College at Schenectady. He also
was a graduate of the Medical Col-
lege in Philadelphia. Studied law
and practiced for several years in
New York. He was married twice,
once to a Miss Marshall of Trenton,
N. J., who lived but a short time.
In 1842 he was remarried to a Miss
Schermerhorn of New York, who
still survives him. Of his six chil-
dren but two sons have outlived him.
In 1848 he made some of the first
importations of short horned cattle
to this country from England, his
partners in cattle dealing were the
late Col. Sherwood of Auburn and
the Hon. Lewis F. Allen, of Buffa-
lo. From 1830 he was most of the
time a writer for the different agri-
cultural journals of this country. In
1854 he was elected by the democ-
rats to the assembly of New York
from Genesee county over Hon. T.
C. Peters, and was the only democ-
rat who ever represented Genesee
county in that body. Deceased was
the democratic candidate for the as-
sembly speakership, but was defeat-
ed by Dewitt C. Littlejohn.

In 1863 Gov. Seymour commis-
sioned him as Major of the 47th
regiment N. Y. volunteers. At the
request of the late Gov. Dix, then
in command of New York city, he
was in 1864 made Colonel of the
123d New York, and afterwards
Colonel of the 186th N. Y. volunteers
which position he held until the war
closed. During this time he acted
as legal advisor to Gen. Dix and as
judge advocate of the court martial
held in the city of New York. At
one time he was engaged in farming
but without success. Up till six
years ago his home was alternately

in New York and Batavia, when he
removed to Kentucky. As a politi-
cal speaker he had but few equals,
and in 1844 was largely instrumen-
tal in carrying the state of New York
for President Polk. Mr. Stevens
was largely known among cattle and
horse dealers in both this country
and England. His death resulted
from gravel and Brights disease of
the kidneys.

Kicked by a Horse.

A deplorable accident, and one
which was at first thought would
prove fatal, happened to Perry Nu-
gent of this village Saturday last.
Mr. Nugent is employed as coach-
man at the institution, and it seems
went to the stable to harness up his
team, and getting in close contact
with a vicious horse nipped in one
of the stables received a severe kick
in the face which knocked him down.
He was conveyed to his room and
Dr. Potter was present at the time
he was called. Upon examination it
was found that he had been cut in
two different places near the left eye
and in close proximity to the tem-
ple. The wound was dressed by
Dr. Potter, and we learn to-day that
the injured man is getting along
nicely.
