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State College Dean Says Criticism Ignores Changes

Dr. David Hartley, Dean of Men at Albany State Teachers College, charged last week that many criticisms of public education ignore the changes of the past 50 years.

Speaking to a joint staff-board of education meeting of the Raven-Coymans-Selkirk Central school Monday night March 24 in the Coymans school, he said that modern psychology has shown that there are different kinds of learning. This leads logically to need for different kinds of teaching. He cited Sigmund Freud's contribution of the ideas that we are all different because we pass through differing experiences and that past experience may affect present action.

The second change, according to Dr. Hartley, was the development of democratic principles in education. Most children of the United States must receive schooling through the age of sixteen, therefore, it is important that we give each child what he needs. Not only must children go beyond the three R's if they are to acquire intelligent citizenship but any child, regardless of his background, should be allowed to go as far as he can.

Dr. Hartley said that we live in a dynamic society. Schools must change to meet changing needs. This is a primary purpose of adult education: the opportunity for adults to meet new needs. He also pointed out that some groups which offer only destructive criticism are doing an injustice to their own children.

At the same meeting David Tier, board president, presented preliminary room schedules for the proposed new junior-senior high school and an elementary school in the district's northern area. In making his presentation Mr. Tier said "There is a vast difference between economy and cheapness. While some people are trying to short-change our children, the proposed building programs are economical, not cheap."

Mr. Tier was assisted by Andrew Koonz and Dr. John Mosher, board members, and by Peter Fulvio, school attorney, and John Brownrigg, school architect of August Luch Associates.

Mr. Brownrigg said that he was impressed by the excellent work of the citizens' committees and the board of education in developing the preliminary work for the room schedules.

In a third phase of the meeting dealing with school public relations, Donald E. Baeker, supervising principal, said that in order for schools to function properly it is essential that the communities they serve know what the schools are doing, since schools must have public support.

Mr. Baeker introduced Richard S. Weiner, administrative assistant for public relations, who discussed the role of professional and non-professional staff members in getting the facts about the school into the community. Mr. Weiner also presented a filmstrip on the subject.

Teachers Salary Notices Signed At Greenville

At the last meeting of the Board of Education of Greenville Central School, it was reported that 45 signed salary notices for the school year 1958-59 had been returned by faculty members to the Board of Education.

Two resignations have been received; the filling of one position is still under consideration by the Board, and an extension of time for a special reason was given another faculty member.

Resignations have been received from Robert Crosby who will be teaching next year in the East Greenville Central School district, and from Miss Nancy Ann Lighthall who expects to be married and to teach next year in Johnstown where her home is located.

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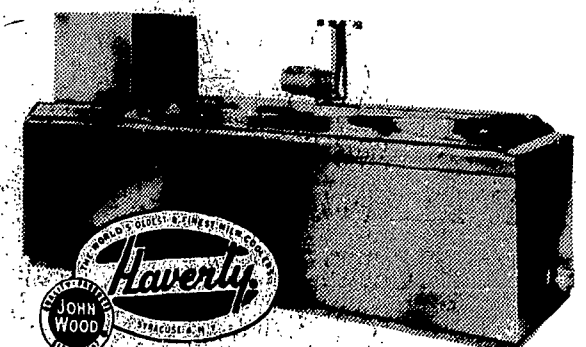
