Classmates Pallbearers For Sisters

Members of the Class of 1970 and the Class of 1972 of Holy Family High School served as pallbearers for the double funeral services for Miss Ellen Romeo, 22, and Miss Barbara Romeo, 19, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Romeo, 7 Northview St., who were among five college students who lost their lives in an accident Wednesday in the Province of Quebec.

Services were held at noon Saturday at Sacred Heart Catholic Church with the Rev. Griffith Billmeyer, assistant pastor and principal of Holy Family School, officiating. The Rev. John Gedbow, assistant pastor, gave the homily. Burial was made in Calvary Cemetery. Phillips Memorial Home was in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers for Barbara Romeo were Jeff Archambeault, Carl Scruggs, Louis Comeau, Larry LaPlante, John Ashley, David Fenton. Pallbearers for Ellen, Romeo were Joseph LaClair, James Toth, Michael Mousav, Lee Elliot, Frank Catanzarite and Richard Podgurski.

The two sisters were among the five coeds who died when the car in which they were riding went off Highway 2 at the Ste. Emmanuel crossing northeast of Valleyfield and plunged into the Soulanges Canal. Death was attributed to suffocation.

The car collided with a second vehicle at the intersection and veered to the left into the canal. Friends of the Romeo girls who were in the vehicle and were also killed were Miss Camilla Ray of Riverside, Conn., Miss Jennifer Loxsom of Stratford, Conn., and Miss Elizabeth Curtin of DeWitt. The girls made a trip to Montreal and were returning home to the Romeo residence.

Four of the five were students at Potsdam State University; three were to graduate Saturday. Miss Barbara Romeo had just completed her Sophomore year at Albany State.

Ellen Romeo was born Apr. 29, 1952 and Barbara Romeo was born May 25, 1954, both in Massena, the daughters of Michael J. and Lois Vallance Romeo. Ellen graduated in 1970 and Barbara in 1972 from Holy Family High School and served as class officers and members of the scholastic band. Barbara was a runner-up in the Seaway Valley Junior Miss Contest in 1970.

They are survived by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael J. Romeo; one sister, Jane, 17, and a brother Michael, 13.

30,000 Kws Allocated To Two Nearby States

New York — The New York State Power Authority Tuesday approved an allocation of 30,000 kilowatts of electric power from its Niagara Project to a group of electric cooperatives in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The allocation was made in accordance with federal law mandating sale of a portion of the Niagara Project output to neighboring states. A public hearing on the allocation was held here last month.

The allocation to the Allegheny Electric Cooperative, Inc., a group of 14 rural electric cooperatives, is subject to approval by Governor Wilson.

The Authority is mandated by terms of the federal Niagara Redevelopment Act to sell a reasonable amount of the output of the Niagara Project to neighboring states within economic transmission distance. The proposed Allegheny allocation will bring such amounts to 180,000 kilowatts and fulfill the requirement for out-of-state sales.

The Authority has previously sold 50,000 kilowatts to the Public Service Board of Vermont and 100,000 kilowatts to the Allegheny Cooperative. In addition, the Power Authority sells 100,000 kilowatts of St. Lawrence

Alcoa Killed In Crash on Motorcycle

Stephen B. Weegar, 21, Route 4, Potsdam, an Alcoa employee, was dead on arrival at Potsdam Hospital Sunday night May 26, 1974, at 7:20 o'clock, following a motorcycle accident.

The body is at the Buck Funeral Home in Colton, where funeral services will be held at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning. Burial will be made in Fairview Cemetery, Parishville.

Surviving are his parents, Robert and Vivian Wood Weegar, Parishville; his wife, Mrs. Patricia Snyder Weegar, whom he married in June, 1973; one brother, Gordon Weegar, The Bronx; two sisters, Mrs. Arthur (Cindy) Bird, DeRuyter, and Mrs. Peter (Amy) Parker, Route 1, Winthrop.

He went ahead of the others and in rounding a curve, hit a frost heave in the road. He lost control of the cycle which slammed into a stone wall. He was ejected.

He was brought to the hospital by the Parishville Rescue Squad. David E. Donaldson, Massena, a St. Lawrence County Coroner and Zone Sgt. D.H. Maring and Trooper J.E. Miller, Canton Zone Headquarters, investigated. The coroner ordered an autopsy. The man suffered severe head injuries, the coroner said.
