

'Milk to Wear' Arts-Humanities Council Reopens At Crane Center

MILK TO WEAR IN STATE FAIR EXHIBIT
Milk for wearing and sculpturing as well as drinking will be featured at the American Dairy Association & Dairy Council of New York exhibit in the Dairy Building at the New York State Fair in Syracuse, August 27 - September 2.

For wearing, there will be a new milk protein fabric known as Chinon and dozens of milk-based skin care lotions and cosmetics provided by Chappell's department store.

Entitled "There's more to milk than a glass of milk," the exhibit will also include a carousel sculpture in butter and a unique display showing how much you'd have to eat of six different foods to get the nutritional equivalent of a quart of milk. For example, just one quart of milk contains as much protein as a pound of bacon or as much calcium as 72 slices of white bread.

In addition, ADA's television commercials on the good taste and nutrition of milk will be featured with copies of newspaper ads in an art museum setting. ADA & DCNY conducts non-brand fluid milk promotion in New York State financed by dairy farmers through the New York State Milk Promotion Order.

The butter sculpture, displayed in an 8 x 10 foot revolving refrigerated glass case, will be executed in the form of a carousel by internationally known William Clements. It will be his sixth butter sculpture for the State Fair and he anticipates it will weigh 600 pounds. The sculpture will be donated to a charitable organization after the Fair.

Reigning over the exhibit throughout the Fair will be Suzanne Cheney, of Bemus Point, 1974-75 New York State Dairy Princess and Susan Brown of Jeffersonville, State Dairy Princess Alternate.

Potsdam — Three Potsdam area men are now awaiting sentencing after they pleaded guilty to drug related charges, Canton zone State Police report.

PUBLIC NOTICE ST. LAWRENCE COUNTY LOCAL LAW NO. 6 FOR THE YEAR 1974
A local law authorizing the Town Board of the Town of Brasher, County of St. Lawrence, to audit and pay claims in a sum not to exceed \$13,300.00 and providing for the financing of payment thereof.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF ST. LAWRENCE:

Section 1. It appears from a petition verified by all the members of the Town Board of the Town of Brasher, St. Lawrence County, it having been filed with the Clerk of the Board of Legislators of said County, that obligations in excess of the amount appropriated in 1973 for the town highway budget have been incurred thru the inadvertence, mistake, error or omission of the town superintendent of highways, that the superintendent has furnished a detailed sworn explanation in writing of the inadvertence, mistake, error or omission and has applied to the Town Board for additional funds to pay such obligations, and that the Town Board has held a public meeting upon notice, and has voted to approve the presentation of a petition to validate and legalize those obligations incurred by the superintendent of highways to the Board of Legislators.

Section 2. The intentional act, mistake, error or omission to be cured is the act of the superintendent of highways of the Town of Brasher of incurring more obligations in the year 1973 than were allowed by the budget adopted by the Town Board for that year and that department. The superintendent built a section of the Mahoney Road (Project No. 43260) for a distance of 0.50 miles without sufficient funds having been allocated therefor and for which no state aid had been received or authorized.

Section 3. The act sought to be legalized is: The incurring of obligations in the amount of \$13,252.50 by the superintendent of highways of the Town of Brasher over the budget appropriated for the expenditures in the highway department for the year 1973.

A public hearing on the verified petition was held in the Town of Brasher by a special committee of the Board of Legislators. It is determined that the intentional act of the superintendent of highways, Town of Brasher, was not the result of fraud. It is determined that no substantial hardship will result from the acts of the superintendent or from the acts of the Board of Legislators legalizing and validating those acts, notwithstanding the increase in budget, and thus taxes, over the period of retirement of the bond(s).

Section 4. The Town Board of the Town of Brasher is hereby authorized to borrow monies not to exceed the sum of \$13,300.00, and to issue its bond(s) for such purpose, with the provision that the maturity of such bond(s) shall not exceed six (6) years from the date of issuance thereof. This borrowing shall become a legal indebtedness of the Town of Brasher to be levied and collected in the usual manner during the term of the bond(s).

Section 5. This local law shall take effect upon compliance with the publications provisions of Sec. 227 County Law and Sec. 20 Municipal Home Rule Law.

from wrecked automobiles. A damaged auto donated by Collins Brothers' service station made instruction most au-

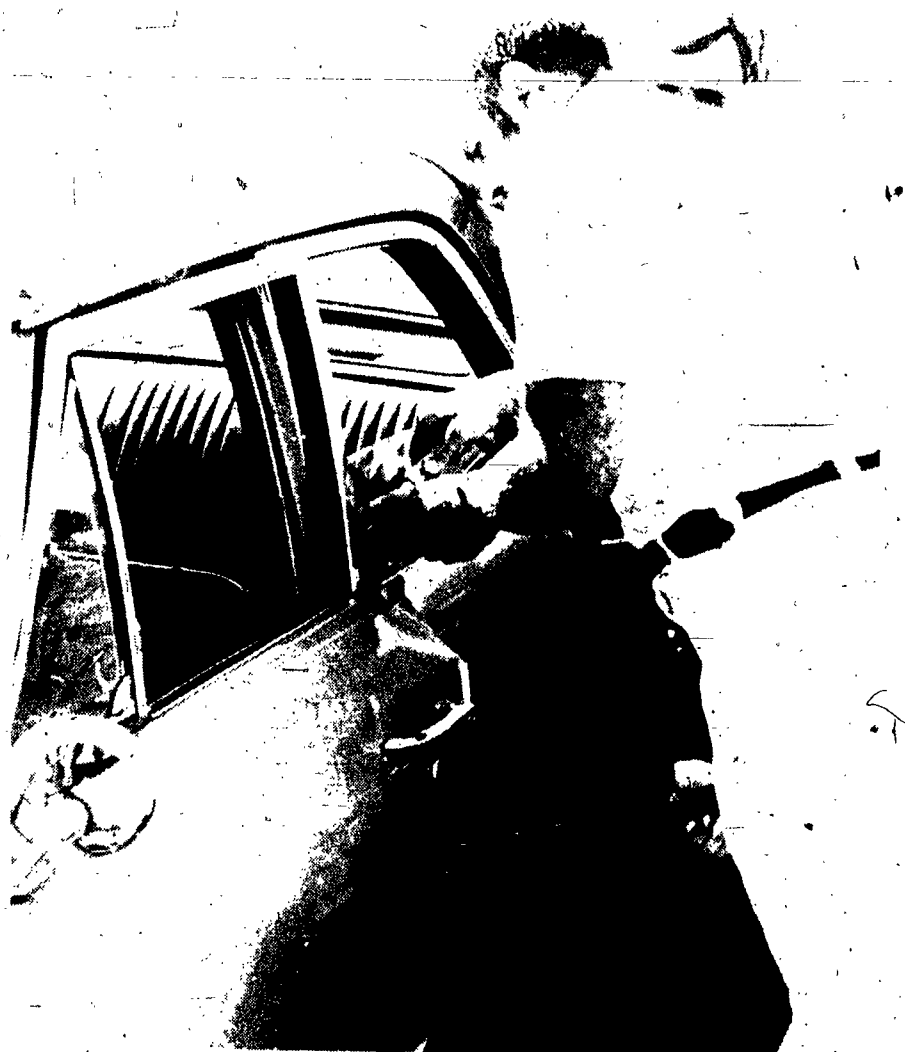
thentic. Special attention was given to the entering of damaged cars using Porta-Power jacks. Mr. Ladd in-

structed the class in the proper placement of backboards and the

proper care and handling of victims during extrication.
