

Raiders, Larries, Shamrocks All Rally To Win Outings

MALONE — It wasn't pretty but the Massena Central baseball team came away with 12-10 win over Malone in Northern Athletic Conference action on Wednesday.

Senior Scott Kallison pitched his second win of the year in relief of teammate Darren Peets. Rick Weegar led the Raiders from the plate with a single, double and triple and three RBI. Peets added two singles and a double with two RBI. John Schneider connected for three sin-

gles and an RBI and Todd Kirkey chipped in two hits as the Raiders rallied from an 8-3 deficit with four in the fourth, three in the fifth and two in the second.

"We had eight errors so I was a little disappointed with the defensive work," said coach Darrel Paquin. "We showed a lot of character coming back the way we did and I think it's a good sign the way we've been putting runs across."

The Raiders next host Potsdam on Friday at 4 p.m. then take on Ottawa in a Saturday double-header beginning at 11 a.m.

In other local games, St. Lawrence Central edged Norwood-Norfolk 4-3 and Salmon River nipped Tupper Lake 3-2.

Salmon River Laxmen Take Native American Tourney

BUFFALO — Facing squads from high schools with a predominant Native American enrollment, the Salmon River Central varsity lacrosse team captured the championship trophy at the First Annual Native American High School Lacrosse Tournament last weekend.

The tourney was held at and sponsored by the University of Buffalo and featured teams from Gowanda Central, Niagara Wheatfield and Lafayette Central.

In their opening game, the Shamrocks took on Gowanda Central and behind the seven-goal effort of Steve Thomas came away with a 14-11 win.

The Gowanda team was comprised of several players of Seneca descent and Shamrocks coach Dave White said Thomas's performance was the difference.

"They were a very swift club but they were young and didn't have a lot of depth. We scored six goals in the second quarter and Steve had four of them. His stick was really on and he was a big reason for the win," said White.

Another factor was the work of senior Mike Benedict who pumped in four goals and assisted on another. Goalie Alex Garrow 12 shots for the win.

In the Shamrocks second contest against Niagara Wheatfield, White said he expected a tougher game and that just what he got as Salmon River had to rally to take an 8-7 decision.

Niagara Wheatfield, representing the Tuscaroras, entered the game having downed Lafayette, the Onondaga team, 13-9.

They led the Shamrocks 3-1 at the half but the locals scored three straight in the third quarter to tie the game at 4-4. Niagara then went ahead 8-4 before the Shamrocks again rallied to tie then took a 7-6 lead midway through the fourth quarter.

The Shamrocks tied the game shortly thereafter then with just over three minutes left in regulation, Benedict set up Charlie Thompson for the eventual game winner.

"We definitely had our hands full in that game," said White. "We were trailing for most of the way but finally managed to take the lead and hold it."

White cited the efforts of newcomer Kurt Jaeger who won a number of key face-offs down the stretch for the Shamrocks.

"That was only his fourth game ever and he did a great job winning face-offs. Some of them led to us scoring goals," said White.

White also credited the work of Garrow and defenseman Louis Lazore.

"Niagara's top player was a kid by the name of Scott Davis. We match Louis against him but we also had Alex helping out. (Davis) still scored four goals but I thought they did a good job keeping him from getting even more."

HOUSTON — Glenn Davis homered in his fourth consecutive game, powering the Houston Astros to a 6-5 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies Wednesday night. Danny Darwin, 2-1, pitched two innings of scoreless relief of Jim Deshaies to earn the victory. In Deshaies' last outing the tall left-hander hurled a 4-0 shutout against the Los Angeles Dodgers which lowered his ERA to 2.67.

Parrett, 1-1, was the loser, pitching 1 2-3 innings and yielding two runs, three hits and two walks.

With the game tied 3-3 in the seventh, Davis hit a two-run home run off reliever Jeff Parrett, driving in Billy Hatcher, who had singled. The home run was Davis' seventh, leading the National League. It is the first time in his career he has homered in four consecutive games. The club record is five, set by Cliff Johnson in 1975.

Davis is the only Astro to homer at home this season.
