

New Village Police Officer On The Job And Ready

The Massena Police Department and Village Board are mutually pleased with the appointment of a new officer that brings the force to full staff while saving taxpayer dollars.

Edward E.J. Clary, formerly a part-time patrolman in Norwood, was officially appointed by the village board on recommendation from Massena Police Chief Dale Wright at their April 4 meeting. Mayor Charles Boots said the ap-

pointment would be a provisional position for six months, at which time Clary will undergo an evaluation to determine if he will continue in the job, a routine procedure with village police officers.

Clary has been working a regular evening shift since then, with time out allowed for completion of municipal police courses that were in his favor for the hiring.

"I recommended that he be hired because he is a qualified police officer who attended Mater Dei Col-

lege and got a degree in Rehabilitative Criminal Justice, had police experience in Norwood and Norfolk, took on extra training with the Potsdam and Ogdensburg Police Departments, and passed his municipal police courses already," Chief Wright said of Clary.

"We saved the village a lot of money by hiring him because he hasn't got to go through the full police school," Wright noted. "All our shifts are fully manned now. With on-the-job training and evalua-

tions, we expect him to be a good officer."

Clary, 24, and his wife Cindy, who works at the U.S. Customs Port of Entry in Roosevelt, reside in Massena.

Village Appointments

In other business, the board made its appointment for the 1989-90 fiscal year. The annual appointments fill positions in the village government and establish the board's committees as well.

As assessor, the board appointed

Larry Logan for a period of one year. Francis Lavigne was chosen as village attorney for another year and Lawrence X. Dalton was appointed justice with Leon Penell serving as acting justice.

Sandra Smith was re-appointed as village clerk for two years, Joseph Trombino will remain as village treasurer for two years, Georgiana Darrow will be deputy village clerk for two years and Laura Gagne will serve as deputy treasurer, two years.

Other appointments included: tax collector — Joseph Trombino, one year; deputy tax collector — Marjorie Belanger, one year; code enforcement officer — Eric Szarka, one year; dog warden — Michael Stephenson, one year.

Also, special police — Paul O'Brien, Allan Pettapiece, Steve O'Shaughnessy, David Smith, Harold Terry and Joseph Mayfield, all for one year; police matrons, Mearle Binan, Marsha Love and Nancy Gunsauls, all one year; school crossing guards, Shirley Patterson, Sally Green, Coleen Foster and Wyona Vancor, all for one year.

Ruth Morris was appointed as registrar of vital statistics for two years, David Frary was named to the Massena Housing Authority for five years, and Andrew Hart and Alex Krywaneczyk will serve on the planning commission for three years.

For the next three years, C.F. Negus, Jack Sauve, David Talarico, John Baxter and Robert Ferreira will sit on the zoning board of appeals.

Official banks of deposit for the village for the next year will be Key Bank, Marine Midland, Jefferson National and Massena Savings and Loan.

The Massena Observer (also Daily Courier-Observer), Watertown Daily Times and The Post-Standard, will serve as official newspapers for the next year.

The village board's monthly meetings for the next 12 months will be held every first and third Tuesday at 7 p.m.

Village trustees were also assigned to committees for the next year. Clifford Littlejohn will serve as deputy mayor, John Feeley and Wayne Lashomb will comprise the audit committee, the entire board will sit on the budget committee, and the fire committee will consist of Littlejohn and Lawrence Prashaw.

Lashomb and Feeley will make up the police committee, Lashomb and Prashaw will comprise the recreation and parks committee, the street committee will consist of Mayor Boots, Littlejohn and Feeley, and Feeley and Lashomb will act as the department of public works safety committee.

The street lighting committee will be made up of Littlejohn and Prashaw, water and sewer committee members will be Littlejohn and Feeley, Feeley will also be the youth council representative from the board, and Prashaw will act as the board's representative to the Greater Massena Chamber of Commerce.

Mater Dei Elderhostel Slated

OGDENSBURG — Mater Dei College will host an Elderhostel Program this summer during the week of July 30-August 5. Elderhostel is an international program which offers older adults summer educational opportunities on college campuses at modest costs. Participants who must be 60 years of age or older, or the spouse of someone who is 60 or older, live in the dorm, eat in the dining hall, take interesting courses, and participate in a wide range of activities.

Courses to be offered during the week-long program include "Contemporary Ireland," "Who is God: Old Testament Perspectives," and "The Brilliance of Baroque" to be taught by Dr. Therese Law, Sister Ellen Rose Coughlin, SSJ, and Sister Gregory Munger, SSJ respectively. These courses are planned to foster new ideas and to expand perspectives in an open, relaxed environment. There are no exams, no grades and no required homework.

The enjoyment of the week on campus will be further enhanced by free time as well as by planned activities such as lectures, parties, card-playing, dancing, picnics and field trips.

According to Sr. M. Patricia

Burke, SSJ, Coordinator of the Elderhostel Program at Mater Dei, over 15 "senior citizens" have already enrolled, coming from as far away as New York, Florida, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, Connecticut, Virginia, and Vermont.

The principal concept of Elderhostel is to provide a compelling educational challenge for older people — to encourage them to study new areas of inquiry or to deepen older established interests and enthusiasm. Mater Dei College is attempting to meet this challenge by providing services to older adults through the Elderhostel Program.

The total charge for one week of Elderhostel, which includes room, meals, and classes, is \$230. The program is also open to local residents who do not wish to live on campus but would be interested in attending the courses and other activities on a commuter basis. The charge for such an arrangement for one week is \$100 (this does not include meals). Meals may be purchased in the college dining hall at reasonable rates. A number of scholarships — called "Hostelships" are also available to help individuals with the expense of the program.
