

Bluejay Eleven Ends Home Season Today Against Ithaca

Jays Slightly Favored To Cop 2nd of Season; Kickoff Set for 2 P.M.

Although there has been no direct comparison between the two teams, Champlain College will be slightly favored for the second week in a row when it faces Ithaca on the football field on the local campus at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the final home game for the Bluejays.

The basis for selecting the Bluejays over the visitors is the comparative records of the two eleven's for the games of the past season. Champlain has a mark of one victory and four losses while Ithaca has played a scoreless deadlock and four losses. That does not give Champlain much of an edge for the two have not played common opponents.

But the fact that Ithaca has scored only three TD's in its five games while the Jays have rung up 10 indicates that Champlain has a more efficient attack which has racked up scores against teams which probably are stronger than those of the Ithacans have met.

Coach Moose Woerner's eleven has chalked up three touchdowns in each of its last three games—against St. Lawrence, Norwich and Loyola. Ithaca scored only on Mansfield Teachers in its opening game; and on Cortland, to which it succumbed by 39 to 6. The Bombers have been blanked by Brockport, Wilkes and Lock Haven.

Another indication that Champlain is finally ready to use both barrels of its attack was seen last Saturday against Loyola when the running maneuvers clocked for a total of 220 yards, something that the Jays have been unable to do in the previous four games.

During the second half, the Bluejay quarterbacks tried only a few passes, hitherto the chief weapon of their offense and relied upon running plays for the gains which were substantial.

Woerner will have all hands available for the contest and likely will go along with the same starters who answered the opening kickoff last week.

Union Booters Face Bluejays

Coach Van Hartman's Bluejay booters will have two marks to uphold this morning when Champlain College tackles the Dutchmen from Union College on the local campus field. They will be fighting to maintain their undefeated record against United States college teams and to keep their goal unscathed. The contest is slated to begin at 11 o'clock.

Only the soccerites of McGill University have been able to score on Hartman's eleven, booting home four goals as they won by 4 to 1 at Montreal, in the third contest of the season for Champlain. The Army Jayvees, Albany Teachers, Oswego Teachers and Genesee Teachers could not get the leather past Goalie Stan Gutin and his fullback assistants, Capt. Bill Burger and Ismet Baker.

Union Center Forward Howie Osborg, high scorer two years ago has been carrying the brunt of the scoring attack, backed up by Enrico Pinerus of Venezuela and Arturo Tanco of Manila of the forward line. Jordan Greenfield, in goal, has been a strong factor in Union's wins to date.

With most of his men recovered from last weekend's trip to Genesee and Oswego where they ran across rough and tough opposition, Hartman plans on using the same lineup which has tallied nine times in five games while allowing only the four against it.

Besides Gutin, Burger and Baker, it will include: Bill Lindberg, Ben Romansky and John Lindberg at the halfbacks; Herb Rudolph at center forward; Art Factor and Bill Miller at the wings; and Fred Brandt and Bob Moroney as forwards.

NEW YORK, (AP)—With blood streaming from his left eye, Johnny Bratton overpowered GI Joe Miceli in a sizzling welter brawl last night to score a technical knockout in 18 seconds of the eighth round at Madison Square Garden. Bratton weighed 148, Miceli 146.

Turning the full stream of his fiery attack on the bewildered Miceli, who was floored for eight in the first round and seven in the seventh, Bratton forced referee Harry Kessler to intervene in the eighth as he rained punishment on the 23-year-old New Yorker, home on an Army furlough.

Bratton, the ex-NBA walter champ from Chicago, took charge in the early rounds but ran into a heavy hail of Miceli's left hander punches from the third through the sixth.
