

Champlain Eleven Routs Ithaca, 39-13; Wilson, Bierly, Rita Spark Win

Champlain College Saturday refused to submit to Ithaca College's football eleven and thus perpetuated a glorious end to college football in Plattsburgh by swamping the Ithacans, 39-13.

The Bluejays completed their home season under clear skies, in shirt sleeve weather, leaving no doubt of the outcome at halftime, with four second quarter touchdowns. At intermission the Blue and White led, 33-7.

Champlain was scoreless in the third period, taking a 6-0 lead in the first quarter and adding a TD in the final. Ithaca scored in the second and third quarters.

Although the entire Jay squad clicked during the onslaught, it was the offensive play of Quarterback Dick Bierly, Fullback Alex Rita, and Halfback Sherman Wilson which ignited the Bluejay triumph.

Each of the trio scored twice and on three occasions Stan Binkewicz converted with placements.

Ithaca's opening kickoff was returned to Champlain's 41 and the Jays began a 59-yard with Wilson going over left guard from Ithaca's 4 after three first downs. Binkewicz failed to convert.

The visitor's held a 7-6 lead early in the second quarter before Champlain went on its TD spree. The Ithaca payoff drive started late in the first period from Champlain's 38. Soprano and Gulnan spearheaded the drive with Cristello finally scoring from the eight. Miller's placement was good and Ithaca led, 7-6.

Then Champlain struck four times quickly, tallying every time it gained possession of the oval.

Two passes to End John Roche set up what proved to be the winning TD. Bierly tossed to Roche in an advance from Champlain's 27 to Ithaca's 28. Roche speared another Bierly aerial and went out of bounds on the one. Bierly went over on a quarterback sneak, Binkewicz converted and Champlain was on its way.

Wilson tallied a moment later after Kane intercepted an Ithaca pass in Champlain's 30. After two plays, a Bierly to Rita pass carried to the Ithaca 37. Bierly hit for eight, Wilson smashed for four, Roche brought in a seven-yard pass gain, before Wilson circled right end on a pitch out to tally. Binkewicz, conversion was true and the Jays were out in front, 20-7.

Martin recovered an Ithaca fumble on the visitor's 24. Bierly passed to Rita for nine, Rita spun for nine, and two yards gains before cracking over. Again Binkewicz converted.

Just before the first half ended, Champlain recovered another fumble on Ithaca's 43 and on the first play Bierly passed to Rita for a TD. Binkewicz's kick was short.

Ithaca marched 54 yards for its final TD in the third period. Miller tallied it with a line back from the one.

Bierly scored for the Jays on the first play of the fourth quarter after the Jays recovered a fumble on Ithaca's 26. On three plays, Bierly went over and Binkewicz's placement was wide.

Each eleven recorded 15 first downs but Champlain outrushed Ithaca, 184 to 154 yards. The Bluejays attempted 20 passes, completing 12 for 233 yards. Ithaca gained 72

air yards, completing seven of 13 aerials. Penalties cost Champlain 50 yards while Ithaca lost 30 through infractions. The hosts averaged 38 yards on three punts while Ithaca's average was 24.5 for two. Champlain fumbled three times; lost possession twice. Ithaca saw Champlain recover four of six fumbles.

Dallas Shirley Address Cage Clinic Here

J. Dallas Shirley of Washington, D. C., president of the National Association of Approved Basketball Officials, stressed neatness of appearance and physical condition, in a half hour talk here yesterday at the third annual Northeastern District interpretations meeting.

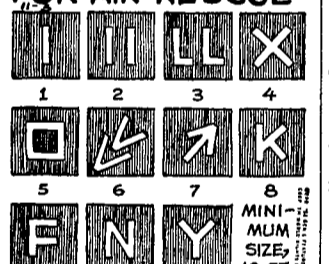
Edward Gallagher, president of the Northeastern board, delivered an address on rules changes. Gallagher was assisted by demonstrations using Champlain College cages.

Bears Upset San Francisco, 20-17

NEW YORK. (AP)—The mighty San Francisco 49ers, boasting the only undefeated record in the National Football League, finally met their Waterloo yesterday when they were upset by the Chicago Bears, 20-17, on a fourth period field goal by Big George Blanda.

Frankie Albert, who passed for one 49er touchdown, turned out to be the goat when he gambled on trying for four yards on a first down on his own 31 with his team ahead, 17-10. He missed and the Bears converted his flub into a score to tie it.

In another West Coast game, the Los Angeles Rams, pulled their record up to three wins and three losses by whipping the winless Dallas Texans 42-12. The Rams had a 35-0 lead at the half in the effortless triumph. Herb Rich of the Rams made the run of the game, a 97-yard touchdown jaunt on a pass interception.

In the American Conference, the New York Giants snapped out of the doldrums and climbed back in to the thick of the battle. Beaten the previous two Sundays, the Giants rebounded and defeated the Chicago Cardinals, 28-6, gaining a tie with the Cleveland Browns for the division lead. The Browns were upset, 17-6, by the Lions in Detroit. In other games, the Green Bay Packers edged the Philadelphia Eagles, 12-10, and the Pittsburgh Steelers outlasted the Washington Redskins, 24-23.

Bill Manley, 63, Dies at The Bronx

NEW YORK. (AP)—William Manley, 63, secretary-treasurer of the International League, died yesterday at his home in The Bronx. Manley joined the league staff as secretary to the then president Ed Barrow in 1911, and became secretary-treasurer in 1928. He had served under five league presidents—Barrow, Charles Knapp, John Toole, Warren Giles and the present head, Frank Shaughnessy, since 1936.

He came to the league from the old New York Press, where he had worked with such famous baseball writers as Dan Daniel, Ernie Langman and Fred Lieb. He was one of the most widely-known men in minor league baseball.
