KITCHEN HINTS.

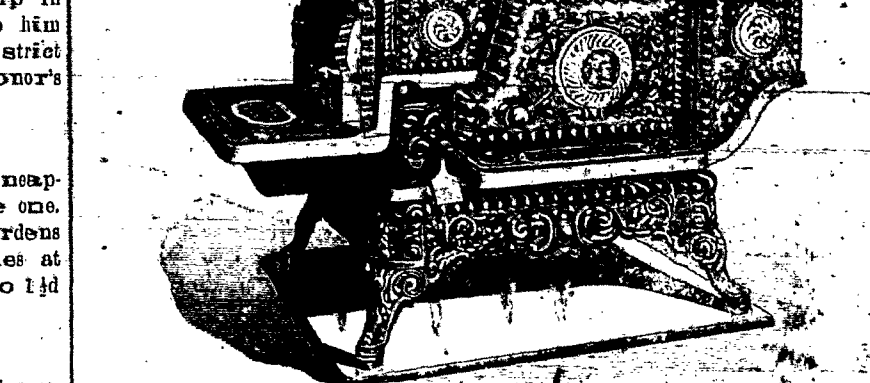
