A New Rule Improving Auto Insurance

Policy Can Be Suspended during Cold Weather and Reinstated in the Spring without Penalty

A new rule of great importance has recently been announced in the automobile line, designed in a practical manner to meet conditions in parts of the country where automobiles cannot be operated at times on account of the cold weather.
It is now permissible, upon request of the assured, to suspend Automobile Liability, Property Damage and Collision Insurance written for twelve months, with the understanding that, upon reinstatement of the policy, when the automobile is again placed in operation, a pro rata premium credit for the period of suspension will be granted. The working of the plan is as follows:

Mr. Automobile Owner intends to lay up his car for the season on December 1st. He notifies the agent, and an endorsement is then issued by the Company suspending the insurance. A copy of the suspension endorsement must be signed by the assured and returned to the Company, as evidence of his understanding that the insurance is no longer in force. In the spring when the owner plans to place his car again in operation he gives written notice of the date to his agent, and the coverage is reinstated with an allowance in the reinstatement endorsement of the pro rata return premium due the assured for the period of suspension. All suspensions shall be dated subsequent to the request of the assured in order to prevent the back dating of suspension endorsements. Similarly, upon reinstatement, the date will be at some time future to the request, or at least concurrent with it.

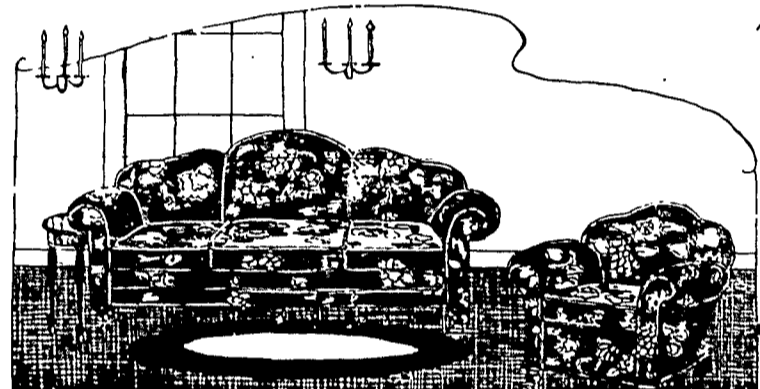
Any assured who does not wish to avail himself of the suspension privilege, but who desires to cancel his insurance, may do so as heretofore, calculation of return premium being made upon a short rate basis. In as much as many policies have been written during the year for short terms on the customary short rate basis, it is permissible to extend such policies for the remainder of the year on payment of the difference in premium between the short term charge at which the policy is written and the premium for twelve months. The purpose of this feature of the rule is to enable those policyholders who wish now to take advantage of the suspension to be able to do so without premium penalty.

We ask all of our policy holders to give this careful consideration for it means a substantial saving over the old plan. 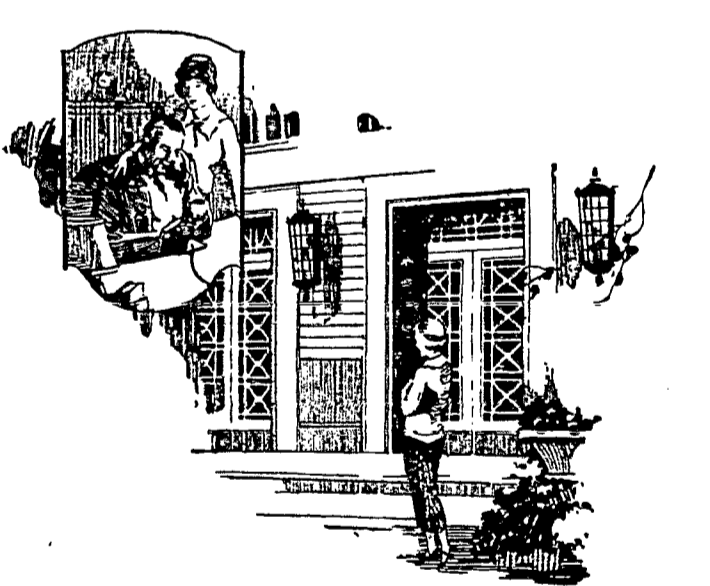
