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Women Boards Want Lines Underground

The... town board and planning board met together last week Tuesday at the town clerk's office and were unanimous in their recommendation that Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation be asked to use underground conduit in preference to aerial lines for transmission of power at the Eastern atomic electric power plant.

The planning board celebrated the town board in its adoption of the ordinance controlling junk yards in the town and recommended enforcement of the ordinance as quickly as possible.

The town board adopted a resolution granting the planning board the authority to approve or disapprove any plans for real estate development in the town.

During the regular meeting of the town board Nick Egan, who said he was planning to build 30 houses on his property on Meeting House road, asked the town to construct streets for the new development. The town board recently adopted specifications for streets to be accepted by the town, and explained to Mr. Egan that the town cannot build new streets but can accept them for maintenance after they are built to specifications. These specifications are on file at the town clerk's office.

The town board adopted a resolution which is being sent to the constitutional convention recommending that no change be made in the state constitution in the present set-up of the local justice courts.

The board awarded contracts to low bidders for two 12-inch culverts 20 inches and one to Mrs. Eubank, Madison, and telephone material to H. S. ...

Mr. Columbus Reappointed To Centenary

The Rev. John B. Columbus was reappointed pastor of the Centenary Methodist church for the coming year at the Methodist annual conference held at Lake Placid last Wednesday through Sunday.

The appointment was made by Bishop Lloyd C. Wicke of the New York area. The local church was represented at the conference by Mr. and Mrs. Columbus and by B. F. Tillotson.

Mr. Columbus, a native of Fairbrouck Heights, N. J., is a graduate of Fairleigh Dickinson junior college in Teaneck, N. J. He graduated cum laude from Upsala college, East Orange, N. J., in 1947 with a bachelor's degree in psychology. After returning from six years service in the U. S. army during which he was stationed in England, France and Germany.

Mr. Columbus took post-graduate studies in psychology at Fordham university in New York city in 1948, and was a real estate broker until he began his study for the ministry in 1958. He entered New York university seminary in 1960 as a part time student while he served the Emergency Shelter mission in New York city as psychologist advisor.

In 1961 Mr. Columbus was appointed to Fort Johnson Methodist church by Bishop Wicke. He was ordained in 1962 and served in various capacities in the New York area until 1965 when he was appointed to the Centenary Methodist church in Granville.

Last May 15 he received his final degree of ordination from Bishop Wicke at the annual conference and became a full member of the Troy conference. At that time he was appointed to Centenary Methodist church.

The Cost of Rearing a Child Is About Four Years Earnings

How much of an investment does the average 15-year-old youngster in Washington county represent?

What has it cost his parents to rear him from infancy to age 18?

Most parents haven't the slightest idea. They don't think of their children in terms of dollars and cents. Beyond knowing that the outlay at certain periods has been large, sometimes staggering, they have never thought about the total cost.

According to studies on this line, made by the Institute of Life Insurance, the agriculture department and the state varies greatly, from family to family but is estimated to be about \$10,000.

On the average, about four years of family earnings are spent in raising a child to age 18.

The studies show that where net income is in the \$7,000 to \$9,000 range, as it is with the average Washington county family, the outlay per child is approximately \$12,000.

Among families in the \$12,000 to \$14,000 category, the expenditures are in the neighborhood of \$51,000 per child, it is found.

On the other hand, those with low incomes, operating on a much tighter budget, spend considerably less than this.

In most families the largest single item of expense is food. The figures show that a girl consumes about \$7,500 worth of food by the time she is 18.

On the other hand, a boy consumes about \$8,500 worth of food by the time he is 18.

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Clark Leads Marchers in New York City

Francis J. Clark of Salem was one of eleven congressional medal of honor winners to lead the march in support of United States troops in Vietnam Saturday in New York city.

Mr. Clark received an invitation from Ray Gimmier, organizer of the parade, to join with other holders of the nation's highest award, in leading the parade in support of servicemen in Vietnam.

It is estimated that more than 250,000 people passed the reviewing stand in the parade which lasted more than eight hours. There were servicemen and veterans, labor unions, fraternals and civic organizations, and many many citizens who marched in the loyalty demonstrations.

Mr. Gimmier, who is a New York city fire captain and marine veteran of World War II, said the turnout was at least three times larger than had been expected.

Among those on the reviewing stand were Lt. Gov. Malcolm Wilson, Senator Jacob K. Javits, Cardinal Spellman, City Council President Frank D. O'Connor and Attorney General Louis Lefkowitz.

A two-hour segment of the parade was televised and the video will be sent to Gen. William G. Westmoreland in Saigon for showing to American troops. The armed forces radio network also broadcast a live radio pickup of the march to all U. S. forces stationed overseas.
