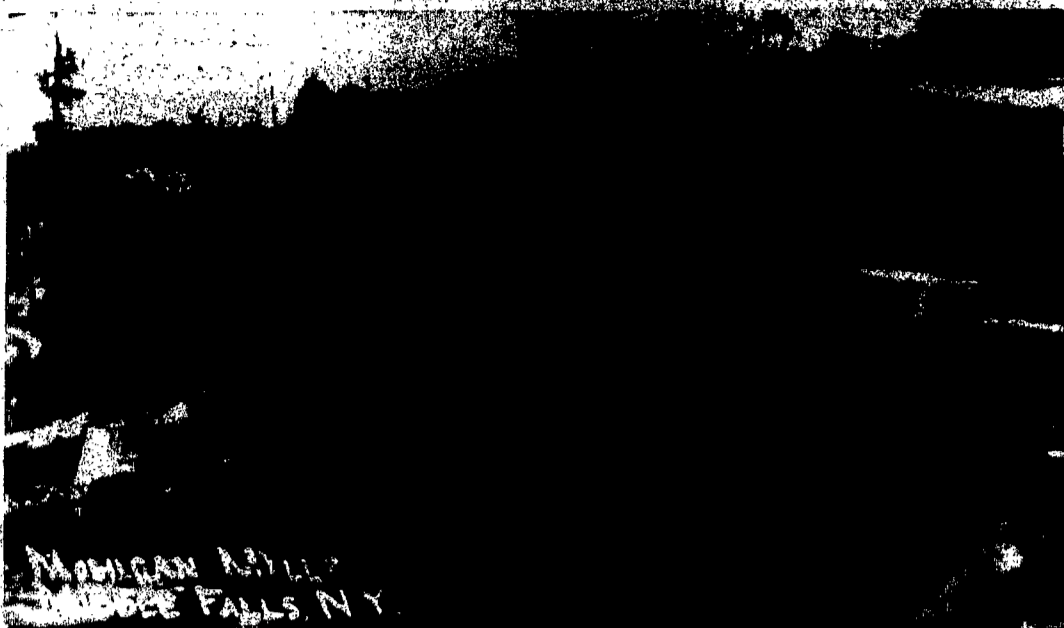


Views of Middle Falls

Farm Bureau Leaders Study Dairy Industry

One hundred dairy leaders from 12 states in the northeast met last week in Stratford, Conn., for a three-day conference to examine the problems of dairymen and to seek avenues of action.

The theme of the conference, Improving the Dairy Farmers' Economic Position Through Farm Bureau, was evidence of a more active role by the farm bureau organization in the dairy industry.

Speakers at the conference who supplied valuable background information were: Stuart Johnson, agricultural economist, University of Connecticut; Wallace A. Mitchell, extension specialist at Rutgers university; William Johnstone, extension dairy marketing specialist, Pennsylvania State university; and Mike Norton, secretary of the National Milk Producers' federation. Also speaking to the conferees were Charles Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau federation, and Roger Fleming,

director of the Washington office.

The members attending the conference not only represented the leadership of the Farm Bureau in the 12-state area, but many of them are also directors and officers of the major dairy cooperatives.

The conference approved some specific recommendations for a course of action. These recommendations will now be discussed by the boards of directors in each state and a regional program developed. Details of the program will be announced after board action has been taken.

Dick McGuire of Jackson, director of the New York Farm Bureau, was one of the dairymen who attended this conference.
