

Seacord's Quality In Holstein Group

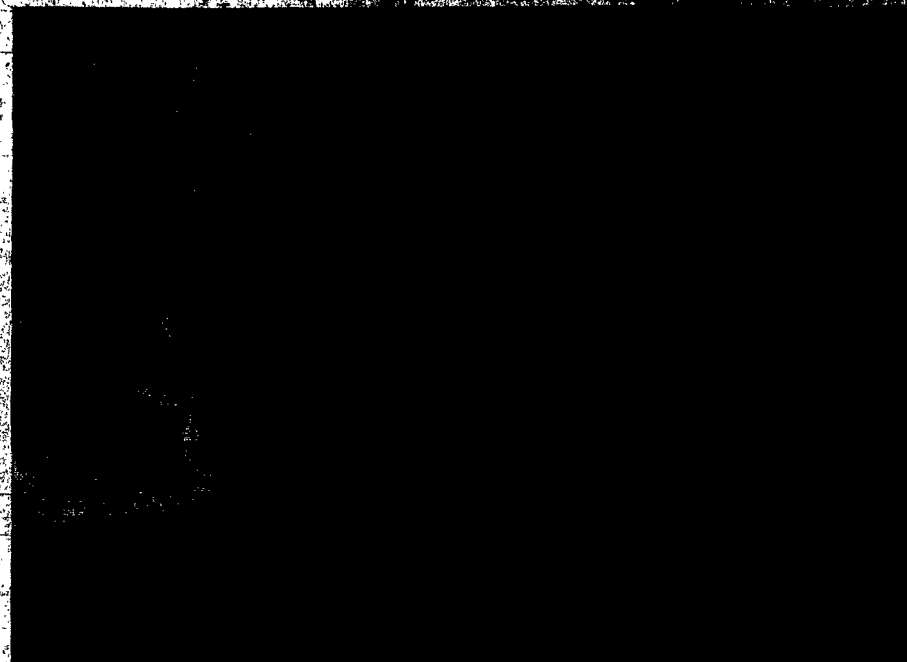

Fort Ticonderoga Museum Attracts Thousands Each Year

The greatest collection of Colonial and Revolutionary war relics and mementos in America can be found in Fort Ticonderoga's military museum—the New York Commerce department reports.

Numerous weapons and articles which were used and handled by 18th century soldiers are on display at the 212-year-old recreated fortress.

Restoration of the ramparts and buildings to their original construction has been accomplished with dedicated authenticity. Today, Major Robert Rogers and his famous rangers would recognize the great stone garrison as the French stronghold he harassed so successfully for the British in the mid-1750's. Even the flowers and vegetables grown today in the king's garden are those which were cultivated by soldiers of the French, British and United States armies in Colonial days.

Last year, 218,000 persons visited Fort Ticonderoga and its museum. It is anticipated a record 300,000 tourists will pass through its entrance archway between mid-May and mid-October this year.

A half-hour guided tour of the fort ends in the museum. There, tourists can leisurely look over its vast collection of 18th century war materials and objects of three nations.

Contained in the museum collections are paintings, etchings, uniforms of the Revolutionary period, powder horns, cannon balls, Indian attire and weapons and tools of the times. The collection also comprises the biggest assemblage of swords, muskets and pistols of early America in the country.

Several rooms of the museum have been furnished as they were in the garrison days. The dungeon with its guard room, has been recreated, accurate to the stones in the cells. Thirsty soldiers of the 18th century would find the present day canteen or wine shop a familiar place to relieve the military boredom of the frontier post.

In the museum's east end room, there is a model of the fort and its expansive acreage of grounds as they existed in 1758. Stories of the great battles fought at Fort Ticonderoga are told via a tape recorder in the model room.

Attractive to the thousands of tourists who visit the site

annually is the Stafford collection of furniture, tools and household equipment used by the early settlers. Table silver and a gigantic punch-bowl, once the property of Sir William Johnson, are on exhibit, as are other rare kitchen utensils of the period.

Children are impressed by the firing of mortars and cannons by gun crews dressed in French uniforms of the colonial days. Target firing is conducted during July through August at scheduled intervals. Uniformed guides also stage cannon drills on a daily schedule.

Tourists can capture all the pomp and ceremony associated with colonial military action at Fort Ticonderoga. The reconstructed fortress today has an 18th century atmosphere, a tribute to the ancestors of William Ferris Pell, who originally purchased the fort and grounds in 1820. Great-grandson Stephen Pell, devoted the greater part of his life recreating the site and assembling the vast museum collection. Pell family efforts preserved the fort, a monumental reminder that it stands for "where the action was" between 1755-1777. The fortress was attacked six times in the 20-year span. Three times it fell. It was successfully held three times. This is a record no other fort in the world can approach.

Fort Ticonderoga is open daily from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., May-June, and 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. July-August.

PRIEST SUCCEUMBS

Rev. Daniel D. Hogan, 80, a priest for 52 years, died last week in Amsterdam after a long illness. Before going to Ballston Lake he had been at St. Mary's church in Glens Falls for six years. Intensely interested in athletics during his entire life, Father Hogan for a number of years conducted a summer camp for boys at Saratoga lake, where the program of activities was highlighted by various forms of athletics, particularly boxing.

Mr. Evans also noted that the new leaflet lists a number of informative pamphlets covering state and federal benefits available to veterans and their families.

GIVEN FULBRIGHT GRANT

Dr. Norman S. Stoloff of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, has been awarded a Fulbright senior research grant. The grant will permit the professor to do research at the University of Birmingham, Birmingham, England. He will use electron microscopy to study defect structures in several metallic compounds and will relate these defects to the mechanical properties of the compounds. Dr. Stoloff, who is on the materials engineering faculty at RPI, has been granted a year's leave of absence from the institute to take advantage of the grant.

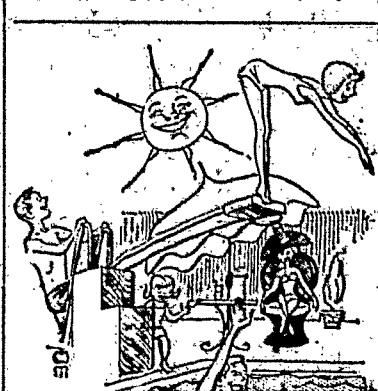

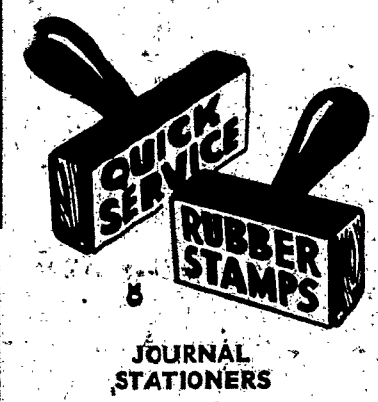
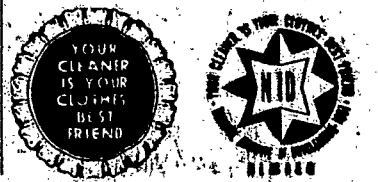
