Earl J. McWhorter, 81, died Wednesday morning in Mary McClellan hospital after a short illness.

A private funeral service was held at the Charles A. Ackley funeral home by Rev. Alastair C. Parr, pastor of Cambridge United Church. Interment will be in Woodland cemetery in the spring.

Mr. McWhorter was born on March 19, 1886, in East Greenwich and had lived in Cambridge for 29 years.

For some years he was associated with his father, the late Joseph McWhorter, in a painting business. Later he was a seed salesman for the J. B. Rice Seed company of Cambridge, the Page Seed company of Greene, and Michael Leonard Seed company. After his retirement from that business, he was employed for several years by the Frank W. Higgins Hardware store in Cambridge. He was a member of the Cambridge United Presbyterian church.
