Route 4 to Be Surfaced Then Rebuilt Resturfacing of route 4 between Fort Ann and Whitehall, announced by the state department of transportation as a project scheduled to begin early in the 1968 construction season, will be only a prelude to a vastly more extensive project, slated to start in 1969, whereby the highway between the two communities will be completely rebuilt, mostly on new location.

Governor Nelson A. Rockefeller, in advising Senator Ronald B. Stafford, Peru and Assemblyman Lawrence E. Corbett Jr. of Fort Edward of the forthcoming improvements, said the work of upgrading the present highway is estimated to cost \$600,000. It will start at the intersection of route 4 and route 148 at Fort Ann and continue northerly 11 miles to Whitehall.
