## PTA Hears Talk On Sex Education

Mrs. Debora S. Preston, who is associated with the state education department, was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Cambridge PTA last week. Mrs. Preston, state consultant in early childhood and parent education, was introduced by Mrs. Burton T. Woodward.

Mrs. Preston titled her talk Sex and Sexuality, urging her audience to concentrate on sexuality. She spoke of the program on the Today show where Hugh Downs presented a discussion on The Pill. Then she went on to say that sex is only one aspect of the developing child and that he can be educated now more realistically than in the past; that taboos of another generation are breaking down; and that women are being recognized now as people.

Mrs. Preston explained about the development of a child and the various aspects of his environment that influence this. She reported that New York City has a sex education curriculum beginning with children in the fourth grade and continuing through the 10th.

She showed slides used in connection with such a course. After her talk, those attending met in discussion groups and compiled questions which were answered by Mrs. Preston.
