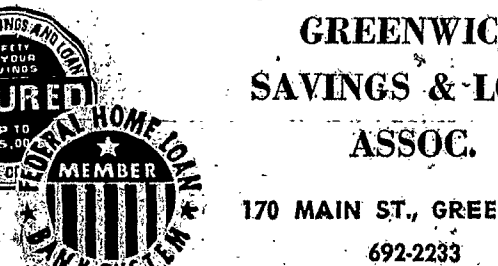
A return to midwifery? A Harvard professor of medicine says nurse-midwives could take over most of the child deliveries in the United States and free scarce physicians for other duties. The system operates in Sweden, where the infant mortality rate is far lower than in this country. In Sweden, the trained midwife follows the patient through pregnancy, reports complicated events to the physician and enables him to follow the patient more closely than the unaided doctor in the United States. Only two states, Kentucky and New Mexico, and the City of New York have license laws that permit practice of nurse-midwifery under medical supervision.

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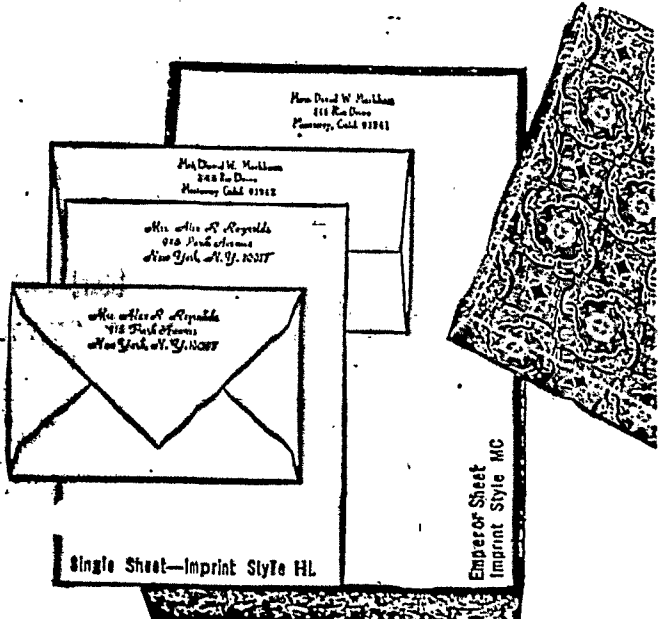
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
