

State Police Report

The state police of the Salem station report recent activities as follows:

On September 11 William Stevenson of New Haven, Conn., received facial lacerations and multiple contusions in a one car accident on Route 40, Argyle. Stevenson approached a curve at excessive speed and crossed route 40, striking a tree and guard rails. He was ticketed for imprudent speed by Trooper P.B. Relyea, who investigated.

On September 12, Harold R. Goman, Warrensburg road, Stony Creek was arrested on a charge of issuing a bad check by Trooper R.E. Endee. On his plea of guilty before Greenwich Justice Thompson, he was sentenced to thirty days in Washington county jail. Goman is 19 years of age.

On September 13, Ernest Cleveland, Star Route, Salem, was arrested on a charge of harassment, which stemmed from a complaint made by a neighbor, Meta Steinberg. Trooper R.A. Painter arraigned Cleveland before Justice Cummings who released him for another appearance.

Pearl Leonard, Greenwich, was arrested on September 16, charged with issuing a bad check by Troopers J.S. Dean and R.A. Painter. She pled guilty before Justice Thompson, made restitution and was given a one-year conditional discharge.

On September 17 Harold R. Goman, sentenced to Washington county jail for thirty days, was charged with four more counts of issuing bad checks by Trooper M.D.

Wescott. A warrant has been lodged at the jail for his arrest and at that time he will appear before Salem Town Justice Warren Bandel.

On September 19 Troopers Endee and Herbert arrested Edward C. Becket Jr., age 24, of Schuylerville for harassment, on complaint of Pauline Burch, R.D. 1, Granville. He will appear before Hebron Justice Howard Crosier at a later date.

On September 21, Sergeant D. Pushee and Trooper R. Relyea investigated a personal injury accident on route 40, Argyle. The operator, Dana M. DePew, age 18, McRae street, Fort Edward, was taken to the Glens Falls hospital in serious condition.

On September 21, Troopers Dean and He-

bert located a seven foot marijuana plant growing in the middle of an area dump. The plant was removed for destruction.

On September 22, Troopers Relyea and Carpenter were called to the innisfail tavern by Richard Young, age 36, R.D. 2, Greenwich, who claimed that his wife had been kidnapped and forced into a car. Investigation determined that she had driven herself home and the complaint was unfounded. Mr. Young was charged with public intoxication and committed to Salem jail by Jackson Justice Francis Ackley. He later pled guilty and was fined \$10.

On September 25, Ethel Michel of R.D. 2, Whitehall, was struck by a car as she walked across county route 45, town of Argyle, from a parking lot to

Sherwood Medical plant where she is employed. An eastbound car operated by Gary S. Rock, age 18, of Hartford, struck the woman with the right fender as she stepped into the roadway. She was taken by Argyle Rescue squad to Glens Falls hospital and sustained fractures to both legs and the left hand, and head lacerations. No charges were placed against the operator by Trooper R.J. Hebert.

On September 26 Darrell R. Bowtin, age 18, of Granville, was charged with failure to keep right after the car he was operating crossed route 40 in North Argyle and struck a tree and house owned by James and Emily Cuthbert of R.D. 2. Bowtin and a passenger, Brian Bowtin were treated for lacerations.

Trooper Winslow charged the operator with failure to keep right.

Also during this period, a total of seven personal injury and four property damage accidents were investigated.

NEWELL K. MacDONALD

The death of Newell K. MacDonald, 77, occurred Sunday, September 28, at the Glens Falls hospital following a long illness. Funeral services were conducted Wednesday at the Carleton Funeral home, Hudson Falls, with the Rev. Clinton Carter, pastor of the United Methodist church of Fort Edward, officiating. Interment was in Union cemetery.
