Telephone rates may be raised

New York Telephone has filed schedules of new rates with the Public Service commission. The rates will go into effect this week end if accepted by the commission.

The new rates are designed to increase the company's annual revenues on its business within New York state by \$298 million. This reflects the 12 per cent overall increase in rates authorized by the commission on October 22 following 11 months of public hearings and review.

Under the new schedule, the basic monthly charge for residence customers will be increased 34 cents. Flat rate business service will be increased 57 cents a month, and message rate business service will go up

\$1.04. Rates for PBX trunk lines will remain the same.

Also included in the changes will be increases for long distance calls within the state, service connections, and equipment charges and a doubling, in most cases, of extra charges for operator-handled and person-to-person calls. However, there will be no change in the 10 cent local coin rate.

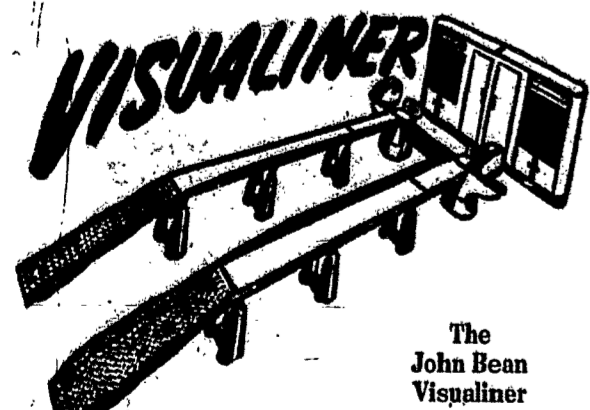
