

Bank elects directors, local advisory boards

Retiring directors George I. Davis and J. Robert Sarle were honored by special resolutions at the annual meeting of the Glens Falls National Bank and Trust company stockholders held February 25.

Mr. Sarle was recognized as having served the Schuylerville National Bank and Trust company, which merged with Glens Falls National in 1973.

Planning board activities

The following is a summary of the Easton Planning board's activities during January and February.

An attorney representing Mr. and Mrs. John Kemmet attended the meeting to further a request for waiver of the subdivision review procedure on land which they had purchased on Meeting House road. A public hearing date was set upon advice of the town attorney.

A public hearing was held on the Kemmet property and the Planning board and the Kemmet attorney each proceeded to build a record on which to base a decision.

The Kemmet application for waiver of procedure was approved with plat modifications to be completed.

A major subdivision proposal on Bulson road and a minor subdivision proposal on Cheese Factory road occupied the remainder of the meeting February 10.

A sketch plan for a

minor subdivision on Vly Summit road was reviewed. The applicant stated that he would now proceed to survey.

The town board and Planning board met in joint session to discuss the building permit law, February 24.

A lengthy discussion was held with an owner of property on Bulson road on economic factors and proper procedure involved in the development of a subdivision.

The Suffolk county plan for preservation of agricultural land whereby the county buys development rights was brought up for brief discussion.

The board rewrote a list of items for the town board as they had been requested to do at the previous joint session.
