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WILL OF MISS SHIPLEY PROBATED THURSDAY.

Disposes of Estate of \$150,000, Bulk of Which is Left to Charitable Institutions.

The will of the late Miss D. Louise Shipley, who died recently in Poughkeepsie, was filed for probate with Surrogate William A. Sawyer Thursday. The will disposes of an estate of \$150,000. Miss Shipley was a member of one of the old Westchester families, and was prominent in Peekskill and its vicinity.

The bulk of the estate is left to the Associated Charities of Peekskill for the founding of a home for the aged in that place. The home will be known as the Shipley Memorial.

Besides this bequest smaller ones amounting in all to about \$50,000 are made.

The Westchester County Bible Society of White Plains receives under the terms of the will \$10,000 and the White Plains Rural Cemetery is left \$300. The Presbyterian Church of Peekskill receives \$1,000, the Orthodox Meeting of Friends, Yorktown, receives \$500, the Presbyterian Board of Home Missions receives \$250 and the Cortland Cemetery, of Peekskill, receives \$500.

George W. Shipley, of Peekskill, an uncle, was left \$12,000 under the terms of the will but in the codicil this bequest is changed to \$9,000. In the original will Mary Louise Shipley, of New York City, was left \$7,000 and was made residuary legatee of the estate. In the codicil the Associated Charities of Peekskill is made the residuary legatee, but she still receives the \$7,000.
