Another of Those Charming Informal Hops.

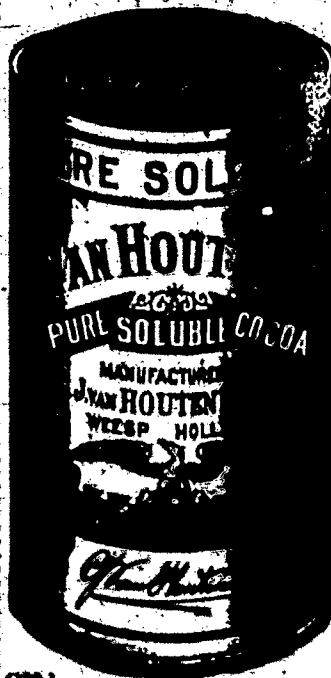
