BY TELEGRAPH. MORNING REPORT. THE WAR IN EUROPE. DESCRIPTION OF THE BATTLE OF WOERTH.

THE FRENCH REHEAT—INTERESTING DESCRIPTION BY EDMOND ABOUT. PARIS, 18.—Edmond About describes the battle of Woerth as follows:

One sees solid regiments who bravely retreat, while a few bad soldiers abandoned, lost, demoralized or dismissed, throw themselves desperately into each by-path.

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AFTERNOON DESPATCHES. THE WAR IN EUROPE. Napoleon Reported Insane.

THE MAIN BODY OF THE FRENCH DRIVEN INTO METZ. WAY OPEN TO CHALONS. PERIAPS TO PARIS. Prussians go Marching On.

NEW YORK, 19.—A private dispatch received in this city, dated London 11:30 a. m., says: The Daily News of this morning contains a despatch from Brussels which says that Napoleon suffers from febrile mania.

THE LONDON TIMES of this morning says: A despatch from Berlin states that the French armies were separated at Metz.

LONDON, 19.—9:30.—A part of the French army has been forced back to Metz.

LONDON, 19.—The Times, in its article on the situation to-day, says: "The road to Paris is open to the Crown Prince, who may leave Charles Frederick to watch Marshal Bazaine."

A Hamburg letter says the people there are quite reconciled to the blockade, adapting their business to its requirements.

THE POST also denies the story recently published of the Prince Royal being in England.

PARIS, August 19.—The Journal this morning says that nineteen Prussian spies have lately been arrested.

PARIS, 18.—The following was made public this morning: Gen. headquarters, Aug. 18, 5 p. m.—In the encounter of the 18th inst., the corps of Gen. L'Amiral formed the extreme right of the army.

THE FORCE OF THE ENEMY in the battle of 18th may be approximately estimated at 150,000 men.

PARIS, 19.—The Corps Legislatif last evening, Count De Palikao, Minister of War, took the floor, and in response to an inquiry made in relation to the fact that Gen. Trochu had been declared Governor of Paris.

PARIS, 19.—The report that the wife of LeBon is a Prussian is denied.
