ROME AND CLINTON RAILROAD.—The Board of Directors of the Rome and Clinton Railroad met at Rome recently, to canvass and to take into consideration the bids for the construction of the railroad from Rome to Clinton. There were eight bids in all. The contract was finally awarded to Geo. B. Phelps & Co. This work is to be commenced on October next, and is to be completed by September next, and as much sooner as possible.

MORNING REPORT.

Surrender of Metz.

World's London special says the statement of a French officer of engineers, concerning the massacre of famished men, women and children before Metz by the Prussians, has been confirmed by official communication published in Independence Moselle.

On October 19th Bazaine called together his officers and informed them of details of Gen. Boyer's mission, showing Bismarck's terms to terminate war, but had no government in France to deal with. He informed them that Boyer was before the council of war at which Moltke declared the military negotiations would be early arranged, but Bismarck said a political view must take the lead. I am inclined to allow the army at Metz to withdraw to an appointed place in the French territory, and prefer there all the deliberations of peace. Bazaine then dwelt upon anarchy throughout France and predicted that the army must separate its cause from that of Metz. He forbade discussion upon his speech among his officers.

Tours 2.—A dispatch has been received here from Arlon, Belgium, which announces that Metz has not capitulated, that is, the garrison, forts and towns refuse to agree to the capitulation of Bazaine, and the Prussians resume their position about the place.

The English Mission.

Washington, 2.—The friends of Senator Morton are urging the President to continue Motley as Minister to England until the expiration of the present term of the Indiana Legislature, when it is suggested that Morton may be again appointed. The Indiana Legislature meets bi-annually, and could not elect a Senator in Morton's stead; and the Governor of that State would have to appoint Morton to an unexpired term—thus securing to Republicans a Senator for the next two years.

The Steam Ship Varuna—Fears for her Safety.

New York, 2d.—Grave fears are entertained that the steam ship Varuna, belonging to Mallory & Co's line, hence to Galveston, has been lost, with all on board. This vessel left New York on her regular trip for that port on Saturday, Oct. 15th, and had no accident of a disastrous nature happened to her she should have been at Galveston after a week ago. Latest intelligence received by her owners of her whereabouts, is that "and only in a message report from New Orleans." Steamship De Sota, which arrived at the evening of the 19th ult., when off Jupiter Inlet, the missing steamship was seen by them but since which time she has not been heard from. Great apprehensions are entertained by those who have relatives on board.

Arrivals of steamships from New Orleans for the past few days, report that the Florida coast is covered with portions of wrecks and parts of once valuable cargoes. But little information is given to the recognition of many of these vessels caught out and torn to pieces by the terrible hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico during the month just past.

The Varuna left this port with 36 cabin passengers, many of whom were members of the first families in Texas, being influential persons who spent the summer north and were returning to their homes for the winter.

Among them was a member of the British Parliament, named Jenkins, who was journeying through the States on a tour of pleasure and observation.

AFTERNOON DESPATCHES.

France.

London, 2.—A deputation of 2,000 persons called upon Gambetta yesterday to petition for the organization of the scattered forces now operating independently in various departments.

Gambetta answered that the salvation of the people was in their own hands, and the government could not even supply them with arms.

The authorities at Tours ascribe the loss of Lajoin to the incompetency of Garibaldi's subordinate officers, and their corps organizations, which rendered the regular French forces at the moment when the latter were most needed.

The Monitor complains of the inactivity of the army of the Loire, which it says now numbers fully one hundred thousand men.

The latest advices from Paris represent that the ardor of the people is unabated, and no doubts arise where expressed of the ability to hold out for weeks, perhaps months.

The supply of fresh meat is said to be sufficient to last till December 15, while the salted provisions will supply the city several weeks longer. It seems, however, that the stores are not judiciously distributed.

On the 15th ult. a riot occurred in a market of the Arrondissement. The population rushed into the market en masse, clamoring to be supplied with meat. The outbreak was suppressed without serious difficulty.

The estimated rations of fresh and salt meats would subsist the city until the end of January.

The journals assert that bread will not be dealt out in rations until the first of January. The supply on hand is ample.

Work on the fortifications is progressing rapidly in the direction of Bagneux, in spite of the determined opposition of the enemy. A large redan was in course of construction there which was expected to add largely to the defensive construction of that line.

The Prussians are constructing heavy batteries near Rezon, before Courberole and at Bas Mendon. They have also planted heavy artillery at Courisy Le Rot on the 27th ult. Gen. Trochu received despatches from Tours dated the 24th.

London 2.—The corpse of a female, in jacket and red flannel skirt, and wearing gold ear-rings and necklace, supposed to be a victim of the Cambria disaster, washed ashore at Rathlin Island, Ulster county, in the north of Ireland, two days ago.

Quebec, 2.—Steamship Scandinavian, from Liverpool, arrived.

Hartford, Conn., 2.—A fire broke out in the boarding-house of Mrs. Cornish, on Church-st., this morning. A chamber-maid named Lizzie Hennessey was smothered to death, and a young lady boarder named Rose Hill jumped from a window and was seriously injured.

Manchester, 2.—Last night while a political meeting was being held in this city the floor of the building gave way, and many persons were injured. Extent of disaster not yet ascertained.
