

**FOUND GUILTY.**

**The "Boodle" Alderman's Second Trial Results in Conviction.**

It will be remembered that the first trial of Alderman McQuade, charged with accepting a large bribe to pass the Broadway horse-car charter in New York, resulted in no verdict, notwithstanding that two Alderman accomplices testified to the illegal acts of bribery in order to save themselves. Because no corroborative evidence was offered at the first trial, the Judge's charge was favorable to the prisoner, and the jury was discharged after being out a long time and being unable to reach a decision, nine standing for acquittal and three for conviction. At the second trial the testimony of the two accomplices, with corroborative evidence, was again offered, and the result was reversed. We give the closing scenes of the trial from the New York papers as follows:

The second trial of ex-Alderman Arthur J. McQuade, on a charge of receiving a bribe in connection with the grant of the Broadway franchise, ended early last evening in the conviction of the defendant. The result was quickly reached when the case was once submitted to the jury. The trial occupied nineteen court days, twelve of which were spent in obtaining a jury. The sessions yesterday were occupied by the closing address of Colonel Bellows, Assistant District Attorney, and a strong charge by Recorder Sm. Th.

The case was submitted to the jury shortly before 7 P. M., and the jurors retired to the Grand Jury room, adjoining the court room, under the charge of the court officers. In less than fifteen minutes the jurors informed Court Officer Curry, who was prepared for a long vigil, that they had agreed upon a verdict. The information was immediately communicated to Recorder Smyth, who had just sat down, with the counsel and attorneys for the people, to a hastily prepared dinner served in the District-Attorney's office. Without waiting to finish their meal the Recorder and his companions hastened to the court-room. McQuade, his brother and his lawyers were already there occupying their accustomed seats. They were evidently prepared for the worst, believing that if a verdict had been reached so quickly it must be against them, since they pinned their only hope upon a disagreement among the twelve jurymen.

"Have you agreed upon a verdict?" asked Assistant Clerk Moser when the jury were seated and the clerk had called the assembly to order.

"We have," responded Foreman Henry Ottenberg deliberately.

"What is your verdict?" asked the clerk.

"We find that the prisoner is guilty of the charges contained in the first count of the indictment," was Mr. Ottenberg's firm and distinct reply.

At the world guilty... who up to this moment had retained the perfect composure which marked his course throughout the long trial, placed his hands on the railing in front of him and drew himself out of his chair until he almost stood erect and then sank back again. The color rose to his cheeks and he looked straight ahead of him for a moment as though stunned. He quickly recovered his self-possession, however, and when he turned around to speak to his brother he appeared as little disconcerted as the most disinterested spectator. General Tracy, Mr. Newcomb and ex-Senator Grady, the prisoner's lawyers, sat as stolidly as though they were not concerned in the case.

After thanking and complimenting the jury the Recorder discharged them and McQuade was taken back to the Tombs to be sentenced later on. The maximum punishment for his crime is ten years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$5,000.

**INDIANS AS CITIZENS.**

**Substance of the Bill Which Gives Them Individual Reservations.**

The House has passed a bill authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to allot reservation lands in severalty to the Indians. Following is the substance of its provisions:

It provides for the allotment of reservation lands in severalty to the Indians located thereon, on their application, in quantities as follows: To each head of a family, one-quarter of a section; to each single person over eighteen years of age, one-eighth of a section; to each orphan child under eighteen years, one-eighth of a section; to each other person under eighteen years, one-sixteenth of a section. If there is not sufficient land on the reservation to allot to each individual the quantity as above provided, then the land shall be allotted to each individual pro rata, in accordance with the provisions of this act. It further prohibits, for the period of twenty-five years, the conveyance of any such allotted land; makes the allottees subject to State and Territorial law, and prohibits any Territory from passing any law denying to any such Indian within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the law. The rights and privileges of citizenship are conferred upon every Indian born within the territorial limits of the United States to whom allotments have been made and upon every Indian who has voluntarily taken up his residence apart from any tribe of Indians and adopted the habits of civilized life.

The provisions of the bill do not extend to the territory occupied by the Cherokees, Creeks, Choctaws, Chickasaws, Seminoles, and Osages, Miamies and Peorias, and Sacs and Foxes, in the Indian Territory, nor to any of the reservations of the Seneca Nation of New York and Indians in the State of New York, nor to that strip of territory in the State of Nebraska adjoining the Sioux Nation on the south.

**An Interesting Duck Shoot.**

During the twenty years which Dr. Ackley practiced in Northern Ohio his reputation became very great. He was a man who was very impulsive in his actions, as is shown by the following incident: One day while out duck shooting he was accompanied by a favorite dog. Another hunter was on the opposite side of the stream, and as the ducks which he shot fell into the stream Dr. Ackley's dog would swim in and get them. The man objected to this, but Ackley told the man he should have all the ducks retrieved by the dog. The man aswered that should the dog retrieve another duck he would shoot him. Ackley replied if the man shot the dog he would shoot the man. Another duck was shot and in spring the dog, and was as promptly shot. Ackley reciprocated by filling the man full of shot from his fowling-piece, after which he immediately left the scene and returned rapidly to the city. Some time later a man came into his office complaining that some one had filled him full of bird shot. Ackley proceeded to pick them out one by one, at the same time condoling with the man, and at the close of the process charging him a good bill.—*Magazine of Western History.*
