

out in a building formerly known as the Riding School, Hachelega Cross, a building which contained a quantity of frame work and other materials in preparation for a new steamer, together with nine dwelling houses were destroyed. Reports vary as to the origin of the fire. A large fire reported at Albany; loss estimated at \$200,000.

Further News by the Acadia.
 Commotion on the Continent increases. The King of Sardinia, with 30,000 men, has made war on Austria, invading Lombardy. The Austrians driven before him from Parma, Brescia, and Desansan. It is supposed all Austria will be overrun. Savoy declared a Republic. Switzerland strictly neutral. Prussia likely to quarrel with Denmark for Holstein.

Russia making vigorous preparations to retain Poland. Ordered every man between 14 and 35 to be removed from Russian Poland to the interior of Russia, concentrating large armies in Southern Russia. In Belgium all attempts at revolution had failed.

Spain.—Violent disturbances in Madrid. 263 people and soldiers fought all night, and many killed. Queen Christina, it is said, ran away. City declared in a state of siege, and tranquil since.

Portugal tranquil. Greece tranquil. Her ministry resigned. In France, government ordered army to assemble on the Eastern frontier.

In Sicily, Parliament formed. Separation from Naples complete.

Irish Address to France presented in Paris on the 3rd inst. M. Lamartine replied, expressing great sympathy for Ireland, but adhering to strict neutrality; condemning Mr. Pitt for interference with France in 1793.

Abdel Kader is removed to Paris, and allowed some liberty.

Belgian, Prussian and Austrian Ministers complain of the demonstrations for liberty of their countrymen in Paris. Lamartine said he could not control the opinions of any one. France would be neutral. He expressed a probability of interference with Poland.

More troops were brought into London, so that the force is now over 10,000 men. Very many strong anti-Chartist presses set against the Government.

Spain.—Some warlike demonstrations are making against China.
