The Adventures of a Baudereo.

A TRUE TONE OF THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC.

(Continued from yesterday.)

The boy found himself standing almost upon the verge of a ledge of rock, elevated some fifty feet above the ground which formed the floor of an immense cavern into which he had been conducted by his captors.
