REMEDY FOR MOTHS.—After the last
of May or first of June, the little mill-
ers which lay moth eggs begin to ap-
pear. Therefore brush all your wool-
ens and pack them away in a dark
place covered with linen. Pepper, red-
cedar chips, tobacco—indeed almost
any strong spicy smell is good to keep
moths out of your chests and drawers.
But nothing is as good as camphor.—
Sprinkle your woollens with camphor-
ated spirit and scatter pieces of cam-
phor-gum among them, and you will
never be troubled with moths.

PRESERVING CHEESES.—If you have
a greater quantity of cheese in the
house than is likely to be soon used,
cover them carefully with paper, fas-
tened on with flour paste, so as to ex-
clude the air. They should be kept in
a dry, cool place.

EARTHEN WARE.—It is a good plan
to put new earthen ware into cold wa-
ter, and let it heat gradually until it
boils,—then cool again. Brown ear-
then ware in particular may be tough-
ened in this way. A handful of rye or
wheat bran, thrown in while it is boil-
ing, will preserve the glazing so that
it will not be destroyed by acid or
salt.
