

MILADY GOES ON HER MID-SUMMER FUR EXHIBITION

Winter furs are selling in July like hot cakes in January. There's a reason. Furriers have made Milady believe that the July price is a few bits shy of the same with medical adornment in the winter time. It may be true and again it may not, but the fact is that the sales force which handles sheer organdies and volles is having a three weeks' vacation while the poor miscreants whose lot is cast in the Hudson seal and ermine alcove mop bedewed brows as they shove North Pole barb at mild and matron. There was a not long ago day when Milady New York would have emerged from the shop into the torrid zone of Fifth avenue or Broadway all swaddled in her new fur purchase, but this year fur salesmen say that "women are wearing a little horse sense," and that their prematurely-purchased garments in vaults where neither dust nor moth dots corrupt, nor thieves break in and steal.

It may be true that womankind is using sense in her fur purchases of this year, but cents have nothing to do with this case. Yesterday's Hudson seal doorman that went for a song and seven hundred bucks and ninety cents is now an even thousand. Is there a cut in H.C.L.? If so, furriers were missed when the information was passed about. For, whether it be a seal from Greenland's icy mountain or a mongoose from India's coral strand, four figures and maybe more are required to express its value.

But, to give even a furrier his due (and we wager much will be due him for some time), never have furs been lovelier and more varied. Even accessories as linings or fasteners surpass in fabric and hue those of any former year. The past year's craze for the Oriental is perking into the next, and Hains and Darnella or Carmen-like in gorgeousness. Metal brocades, gold and silver embroideries, heavy satin ribbons, and metallic laces in Algerian blue, Chinese red, or

Cleopatra green, line all winter furs from seal to leopard. Bona fide coats with fitted sleeves are still unknown in the fur realm. The prominent cut is that of the full cape starting from the shoulder, unbelted, and with Mandarin sleeves. The doorman coat, cut straight from shoulder to hem and unbelted is another prime favorite. The modish long-waisted effect was shown with a fur revve by a coat of mole with waist extending well below the hips, from which hung a skirt of two pleated bouzoucs. An other novel effect was shown in an ermine model with three scalloped, shoulder capes. Narrow, scalloped bands of ermine overlapped all the capes onto the main, cape foundation.

Many big, wrappy dolmans of gray squirrel or mole are shown. These have long, straight back panels housed in the fur realm. A black and sleeve are cut into a fur cape effect falling unbelted from cuff to hem. The most expensive wrap upon display would not name his price—was of tiny ermine skins arranged so as to form a huge spider web in front and back. The cape was barrel-shaped, the increased width of the body being effected by a flaring circle of spider webs. Another novelty was made of sable. The skins were run from the neck into a deep border at the hem, then reversed and run about the bottom so as to form a contrasting shade.

Hudson seal coats of thirty-six length remain the good old standby. Contrasting bands of squirrel, Canadian marten, or Australian opossum are used lavishly with seal. For sport wear are shown short fox coats of leopard trimmed with seal, or chic, short coats of mink or squirrel with fitted lines. White furs are taboo, with the exception of ermine which to be realistic must only be worn at the right place at the right time.

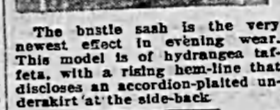

Her very sex gives her influence over the child whose mischief has brought him under the notice of the police before the mischief takes the form of crime, and over the mother to whose neglect the offense of the child is so often due."

HYLAN IN Liberals in Co PARTIES IN KEYNOTE SP

Says Convention Is Called to Meet Insistent Demand for New Party

Chicago, July 10.—Abolition of privilege was made the slogan of the convention of the Committee of 48 in the keynote speech today of Allen McCurdy, New York City temporary chairman.

Denouncing the Republican and Democratic parties as "hold bid ders for the opportunity to be agent of the rapacious interests for the next four years," McCurdy declared the present convention was called to discover whether a political party with the abolition of privileges as its paramount issue can be created.

McCurdy reviewed the platforms of the major parties and asserted that the party leaders "are without the vision of statesmanship, the courage of leadership or the conviction of patriotism." He said there "is not a word in either platform that might not have been written and endorsed by a competent corporation lawyer and Wall street banker."

In part McCurdy spoke as follows: "The Republican bid is bold. It reads out of its councils every man and woman who ever stood for any form of human rights."

The others faced a similar fate. Eugene Cullinan, James H. Doolittle, Charles L. McNary, William J. Cronin, Charles L. "The Democratic bid is more than bold; it is brazen.
