

ELMS, AFTER BRIEF FIGHT, ARE SWAMPED BY CASEYS

Then Fade Out—Final Score 10 to 4

Field hopes entertained by the Elm Field Club and their host of solid supporters of morning into the Staten Island championship series this fall were sadly punctured yesterday afternoon at Sisco Field, when Manager Squier's team was swamped by the Casey boys.

The Elms fought hard and for a time had the satisfaction of leading by one run. With one down, Voepel suddenly slipped on his control and walked Westrom and Taylor. The Lunny play was all that made the Casey's more than a good inning out a long triple by Lunny in the fifth inning and a homer to left in the sixth. Jimmy Doolan gave Manager Squier the best third base play he had since Eddie Moran's biggy made it necessary for Wilbur Taylor to switch from third to second.
