Mr. and Mrs. M. Ryan of Buffalo spent the week end with relatives in Warsaw.


FRED NORRIS
 The funeral of Fred Norris, a former newspaper editor and a resident of Warsaw many years, who died Thursday, May 11th in the Wyoming County Community Hospital after a long illness, was held at the Weeks Funeral Home on Sunday, May 14th at 2:00 p.m. with the burial in Grace cemetery, Castile. The Rev. Thomas E. Asbury of Warsaw, officiated.

He was born in Canastota, N. Y., on October 8, 1862, the son of Archibald R. and Helen Shipman Norris and on July 12, 1893 he was married to Julia A. Pickett of Castile who survives him, together with two nieces, Mrs. J. T. Sallee of Pacific Grove, Calif., and Mrs. Julia S. Mason of Warsaw, a grand niece, Mrs. Victor Reinstein and a great grand niece, Julia Anna Reinstein, both of Buffalo.

Mr. Norris purchased the Castilian in Castile in 1888 and sold it in 1911 when he purchased the Wyoming County Times of the John Underhill estate and continued to publish the paper until 1926 when he retired and sold the paper to Levi A. Cass.

Mr. Norris was an elder in the Presbyterian church in Castile and later in the Presbyterian church in Warsaw. He also served as a member of the village boards, both in Castile and in Warsaw. He became a member of the Masonic Lodge in Castile and was later a past master of Warsaw Lodge, F. & A. M.
