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Results of Newspaper Poll For Governor Are Very Interesting

Dewey, Hanley and Moore Lead on Republican Ticket — Fitzpatrick, Mead and Farley, Lead on Democratic Ticket — Roosevelt Name Has Lost Its Magic Touch in This Area.

This recent poll as tabulated on Gubernational candidates taken by the Wyoming County Combination of Newspapers, reflects certain trends in Wyoming County. In the Editor's opinion, the Republican race would forecast the selection of Governor Dewey as the most popular candidate; however, in the event Mr. Dewey declines or with draws, there seems to be no doubt that our own Governor Hanley is the popular choice for the nomination, being without question the strongest contender, possibly with Goldstein as a running mate.

We hear considerable rumbling in the GOP ranks relative to replacing Mr. Hanley with a different candidate, even if Governor Dewey does decide to make the run, which in our opinion would weaken the ticket considerably. Our poll shows that the citizens of this county are overwhelmingly in support of Mr. Hanley for second place on the ticket and for first place, if Mr. Dewey elects to step out.

Mr. Moore also made a surprisingly good showing, as a possible choice for first or second place on the ticket in the event of a fight for position.

On the Democratic side of the picture, it seems to be very conclusive that the voters want Mr. Fitzpatrick as the nominee since he maintains a commanding lead of two to one over any other possibility. The runner-up, Mr. James Mead, proves that upstate voters are very definite in their choice of an upstate candidate for the Governor designation. In reviewing the balance of the Democratic vote, certain complications arise which are difficult to diagnose.

It is interesting to note that the Roosevelt name, particularly in this area, if not in the entire upstate, has lost its magic vote appeal as shown by the extremely poor first place showing made in the poll, and there does not seem to be any cumulative interest in another Roosevelt, in the state at this time to top the ticket.

Other possibilities, Farley and Ewing, however, have shown extremely good vote getting ability, considering the fact that Farley has, in the past elected to take vacations during crucial elections; and that Ewing's Health Insurance plan has extremely opposition by the medical profession in this area.

The complete lack of any interest for Pecora, Harriman, Froselle or others would seem to indicate that the voters are not familiar with these names and that the Democrats would have a difficult job on their hands if their convention includes them on any ticket, particularly upstate.

The poll seems to be typical and the percentages seem to stand up during the entire tabulation, the total participating represents about six per cent of the registered voters of the county and about 16 to 20 percent of the voters in the (Kindly turn to page 4)

Warsaw Clinches Tie for Baseball Co. Championship

Defeated Attica 7-1 on Monday at Warsaw Diamond-Williams Turned Back Attica With Only Two Hits

A victory in either of their remaining two games will give Warsaw Central undisputed possession of first place in the County League and earn them the right to enter the Rochester Sectional Tournament which includes eleven counties.

If Warsaw should lose both of their remaining games a tie for first place could result which would necessitate a play off game before the sectional tournament. Walt Williams turned back Attica for the second time this year on Monday of this week. He allowed only two hits but had some nervous moments as seven bases on balls, one hit batter, and a couple of infield errors kept the bases well occupied.

Warsaw was not strong at bat in this game and bases on balls followed by infield grounders with Warsaw runners beating the throw to the plate plus two or three costly errors by Attica netted most of Warsaw's seven runs. The week's idleness due to wet weather seemed to affect the Warsaw boys as they could not lay down a well placed bunt which has been one of their strong offensive points all season.

Jim Gallahan, Fritz Eisenhard and Lee Cass stood out on defense in the Attica game with some sparkling plays. Batzold, Grover, Roncone and Stubby all handled one or more difficult plays successfully. All that Sam Carlino out in right field had to do was watch the game and rest up for his next pitching assignment. He and Joe Roncone had the only extra base hits for Warsaw.

Plans Are Made for an Active Program This Summer

The Warsaw Tennis club was officially organized at a meeting held last Wednesday evening, May 17. State Meeting On T. B. Held Last Week

New York State was One of Few States to Raise its Quota for 1949

The annual business meeting of the New York State Committee on Tuberculosis and Public Health was held last week in the Hotel Commodore, New York City. Those in attendance from Wyoming County were Mrs. Walter Peckham, Auditor of the Wyoming County Committee and Mrs. Charles B. Smallwood, Executive Secretary. At this time the program of work and the budgetary allocations for the fiscal year beginning October, 1950 were presented and voted upon.

Tuberculosis receives the greatest amount of interest and comes first on the list of projects on the program. Co-operative efforts must be continued to achieve substantial eradication of this disease during the year. Additional lines of work include venereal disease control, heart work through affiliation with the American Heart Association, mental health education, and continued school health education.

The 1949 Christmas Seal Sale was reported on and plans announced for the 1950 Sale announced. New York State fulfilled its pledge of an increase over the sale in 1948 though most of the states did not do so.

The new Director of the State Committee, Dr. Henry S. Mustard was honored at a luncheon on Wednesday. Dr. Mustard gave a scholarly address dealing with work and hopes of the State Committee in Health and Welfare.

The Wyoming County Committee hopes to have Dr. Mustard as guest speaker at the annual Fall Dinner Meeting to be held here in October.

Architect's Survey for Hospital Study Has Been Approved

An expert architectural study of possible hospital construction in Wyoming County was assured last Wednesday night as the Board of Supervisors, through its hospital committee, approved an agreement with the firm of Cannon, Thiele, Betz and Cannon of Niagara Falls.

The agreement calls for preliminary sketches and cost estimates of alternate proposals, one based on the salvage of acceptable parts of the existing Community Hospital, Warsaw, and the other contemplating a new site. The architect's survey was requested by the Joint Hospital and Medical Study Committee of twelve, for inclusion in its findings.

The Cannon firm was chosen from among many applicants because of its vast experience in planning and supervising hospital construction for more than two decades. Hospital programs in which they are now engaged include the Genesee Memorial project in Batavia, Tri-County Memorial plant at Gowanda, Brooks Memorial hospital expansion in Dunkirk and many others serving communities similar to Wyoming County.

Andrew Reitschky of Portageville is chairman of the hospital committee; other members are George Hume of Silver Springs, Frank Hanley of North Java and Clayton Gallett of Warsaw.

The Board of Supervisors voted 15 to 1 at its last meeting to appropriate funds for an architect's survey.

Two Sentenced Last Monday by Judge Conable

Frazier Admitted He Shot His Wife - Was Given Indeterminate Sentence at Attica Prison

On his plea of guilty last Monday to an indictment charging first degree assault, James S. Frazier, 45, of Creek Road, near Bliss, was sentenced by Judge Barber B. Conable to an indeterminate term in Attica State Prison, of from three to ten years. Frazier was immediately transferred to Attica by officers from Sheriff Lewis Spring's office from the Wyoming County Jail, which he had been confined since commission of the assault last February 25th.

Specifically, the indictment charged Frazier with shooting his wife, Berdine, in the back with a small caliber rifle last April 25th, the bullet lodging in the right lung. The indictment alleges that Mrs. Frazier was short while spending the night with a neighbor, Mrs. Laura Zeeches, after a quarrel with Frazier.

Indicted on a third degree burglary charge, Donald Pyne, 20, of Buffalo, on Monday entered a guilty plea to reduced charge of unlawful entry, with permission of District Attorney Charlotte Smallwood and Judge Conable suspended sentence because Pyne is in the U. S. Navy. He appeared in court in uniform.

The indictment alleges that the defendant illegally entered a Java Lake cottage April 9th with Helen Gleason of Buffalo, who was also indicted on third degree burglary charge. Judge Conable dismissed this charge against Miss Gleason, who said that Pyne claimed to her that he owned the cottage. Investigation showed the cottage was owned by Charles S. Madison of South Buffalo, according to Deputy Sheriff Herbert Shaw.

Judge Conable deferred sentencing Walter Gage, when he pleaded guilty to the second count of an indictment, charging him with operating a stolen car. He had previously entered a plea of innocent to a charge of stealing the vehicle. Sentencing was deferred until May 29th.
